August 15th, Los Angeles celebrated the 131st anniversary of its founding by the Spaniards. It was on August 15th, 1781, Felipe de Neve, governor of Alta California, came from the San Gabriel mission to the Indian village of Yang-na, and gave the settlement the name of El Pueblo de Nuestra Senora, la Regina de Los Angeles; the imposing title translated into English, meaning the town of our lady, the queen of the Angels.

Mayor Shank of Indianapolis, who has attracted attention for his efforts to reduce the cost of living in his city, was an aspirant for the office of governor with a platform containing the up to date plank of "state control of the market situation." Indiana of course, couldn't exactly control the market situation, but it might experiment to general enlightenment if its determination should be wisely directed. Shank got left.

Co-operation among farmers means more than mutual financial advantage. It lays the foundation of a higher social order. Too long the farmer has been an individualist. Too long the country has lagged behind the town, a condition which, in part, is due to the fact that every man has acted independently of his neighbor. The modern social and economic status has been attained by mass movement. The farmer must utilize this principle.

The veto of President Taft helped the wool market for a few days, until the house passed the bill over the veto. Some sheepmen think it would have been better to let the wool bill go with half the tariff off, than to leave the matter unsettled until next year, when a democratic congress may take all the duty off.

The Founding of Chicago Celebrated.

On Tuesday of last week Chicago turned back the pages of her history and commemorated the one hundredth anniversary of the Fort Dearborn massacre, from which event dates the real beginning of the career of the western metropolis. Under the joint auspices of the Chicago historical society, the society of the war of 1812, and the United States daughters of 1812.

Fort Dearborn, located near the mouth of the Chicago river, was built in 1805 under the superintendence of Major John Whistler. At the beginning of the second war with Great Britain the fort was occupied by Capt. Nathan Heald, with a garrison of 54 men. Upon orders of Gen. Hull it was evacuated August 15, 1812. Immediately after which the Indians burned the fort and began a massacre of the garrison and residents of the little settlement that had sprung up near the fort. A total of 39 men, women and 12 children were slain before the Indians were driven off.

Get Ready for an Open Columbia River.

With \$700,000 now at his disposal and a prospect for an appropriation of \$1,000,000 at the March session of congress, Capt. Roberts, the government engineer in charge of The Dalles-Celilo canal work, predicts that work on this project will now continue uninterruptedly until completed, which will probably be within the next two years. This appropriation is \$100,000 more than the 1911 appropriation, and should the \$1,000,000 asked for be allowed by the next congress, work can be pushed to the limit with a full crew of 700 men, all the time until the finish.

Advice Gratis, How to Save The Crops

It is poor policy to let a crop be injured by rain after it is grown, when it can possibly be avoided. Salt Invaluable to Mankind.

For Your Scrap Book.

If food is tasteless without salt, it is ruined with too much. Unappetizing cooking is often due to guesswork. A level teaspoonful of salt is sufficient for a quart of soup, sauce or vegetables.

Salt used once a day is an excellent dentrifice, tending to keep off tartar. It is said to retard receding gums.

A half teaspoonful of salt added to a cup of hot water, which many persons take each morning, will make it palatable.

Do not gargle with salt water. Throat specialists consider it injurious to the tender mucus membrane of the nose.

Salt water rots the hair, so never fail to rinse with fresh water after sea bathing.

To set color in wash materials, and embroidery cottons, soak them in strong salt water.

An excellent tonic for nervous people is to take a salt rub twice a day. As sea salt dissolves slowly, some of it can be kept in solution in a glass jar to be ready when needed.

When a child is inclined to bow legs, or to have a weak back, rub it night and morning with strong salt water.

A faded carpet is freshened if wiped off with a wet cloth wrung from strong salt water; sprinkle floor with salt and sweep well.

Bad dyspepsia can be helped by dissolving pinches of salt on the tongue after eating, or when there is a sense of oppression.
