An interesting letter from the pen of Dr Slocum, a recent visitor to Sherman county, makes interesting reading in the Oregon Daily Journal of the 11th, page 12. It tells of the farms of O L Belche, F A SAYS and W S Powell.

Mrs John Myers, wife of the butcher at White Salmon, is not only the only woman cattle buyer in the district, but is also considered the most expert; she is an accomplished horsewoman and can rope a steer with the best cowpuncher on the range.

C R Ball, in charge of grain industry inspected the experiment station here last week, in company with Prof Hyslop of the O A C. Prof Bexell, also of O A C was a visitor in Moro in the interest of the state immigration bureau, of which he is secretary.

No sooner did Fred get his machinery running again after the visit of the midnight destroyer, than he was called on to face the loss of his barn and about 40 tons of hay. The fire was caused by two children playing in the hay with a box of matches.

LaDru Barnum brought in some fine samples of corn, broom corn and sunflowers, Monday, from a farm opposite Sherar bridge.

Chris Andersen and family have returned from their Crook county visit, accompanied by Mrs Roy Powell, who will remain a few weeks.

Soren Hansen finished cutting and stacking 350 acres on his lease holdings north west of this city on the 21st, and is now ready for the thresher.

Mrs Fred Hennagin of Mountain View Farm has returned from visiting her father, Granville Phillips, at Sunny Cove Poultry Farm east of Kent.

Business firms in Moro are on the move. B F Peetz moves across the hall to his former office; Attorney Saunders takes the office vacated by Mr Peetz, formerly occupied by W C Bryant, and L W Ross will open a jewelry store in the place vacated by Mr Saunders.

W C Harper of Sheridan, another Yamhill titlicon of The Observer who has been away from Sherman county several years, arrived in Moro on the 19th, and while things look good to him here he has little hope of his return for keeps, as he is well fixed on a farm in the prolific and bountiful land of the old-time valley of Oregon.

Here is the Trap to Catch the Rodents.

This trap has been known to catch the rodents by the bushel. Procure a water-tight barrel, put a rock in the bottom that will reach up about a foot high and pour in sufficient water to nearly cover the rock, leaving just the upper points sticking out and it should be about large enough to hold a single rat. In place of the upper head, stretch a piece of canvas over the top of the barrel and fasten it securely by means of the top hoop or a cord. Feed the rats on this cover with cheese parings and other things they like for several nights in succession, so as to get them accustomed to coming without fear or suspicion. After you have gained their confidence, cut a cross slit in the middle of the canvas and spread the feed as before. The first rat that comes will drop into the water and get on the rock. The next one drops through and there is a fight for a foothold and they argue the point with squeals that all the rats in the neighborhood hasten to find out what the trouble is about.
