This week Tuesday was not so ideal, on account of a miniature electric storm Monday night which put the temperature at fall under clothes, and caused fires to be kindled in office heaters. Harvest has not suffered any by the sudden change, only delayed a bit, but that is regrettable considering the near approach of the generally dubious September.

For Your Scrap Book.

If you are so unfortunate as not to have a scrap book we can furnish you one at The Observer Book Store.

As soon as shrubs are through blooming, prune them so that new and vigorous shoots will be sent out for next season's blooming.

Pick blossoms of pansies, sweet peas, violets and nasturtiums daily, if you want them to give the best results in blooming.

An excellent fertilizer for delicate out door plants, or potted plants, is liquid manure made by leaching water through manure.

A quarter of a pound of ordinary white soap dissolved in a pail of water, makes an excellent spray for aphid that attacks sweet peas.

Carnations, chrysanthems, and such plants as are to be grown in pots for early winter blooming should now be planted out doors for fall growth; they will be all right in 30 days for repotting.

When juice is left from canning it may be boiled low, made into jelly, or syrup for flavoring.

The skin of new potatoes may be removed more quickly with a stiff vegetable brush than by scraping with a knife.

Rub your stove off daily with a newspaper; it will keep it in fine polish, and will not be so harsh on the hands.

Don't use a galvanized iron lemon squeezer; when brought in contact with the lemon it forms a poisonous salt.

When anything is accidentally made too salty it can be counteracted by adding a table spoonful of vinegar and a table spoonful of sugar.

For the destruction of ants, spiders, cockroaches, etc., a strong solution of alum, in boiling water, poured over the infested parts, will be found excellent.

The water in which onions have been boiled in is excellent for cleaning gilt picture frames. It not only removes specks and dirt, but brightens up the frames in a wonderful way. But it should not be used until quite cold.

To keep gold and silver chains bright, and lengthen their service-ability, wash them occasionally in soap water rinsing in clear water; this removes the dust and grit that gets into the links 'tho not always discernable to the naked eye
