Machine Farming Profits the Producer

Howell Bros. Caterpillar-Combine Harvester outfit, and also their horse drawn combine outfit finished their harvest operations for 1912 September 20th; between the 16th day of July and that date they have sacked the wheat off 2,200 acres. In 24 consecutive days they lost nine harvest days, on account of rain, as well as considerable parts of other days.

Howell Bros. have had experience with different makes of machines, and they claim that their present method of threshing gives more continuous uniform power, and the motion is the best for the work to be done.

In the face of the fact that some contend that only a steam rig will thresh Turkey-red wheat clean, Howell Bros. got a general average of 15 sacks off 500 acres of that class of wheat. Another 250-acre field of Turkey red went 4,050, more than 16 sacks. Another field of 260 acres went 3,908 sacks of Turkey red; 100 acres of this field was disced last fall before plowing, and that part went 18 sacks to the acre, while the other 160 acres went a little more than 13 sacks, a mighty fine object lesson in cash return on time spent in disced before plowing.

The Howell Bros caterpillar machine is now busy discing the land preparatory to fall and spring plowing. Last fall they disced 160 acres in an even 24 hours. Their caterpillar machine easily averages 40 acres per day at a total cost of operation (exclusive of wages) of 15 cents per acre.

Sara B F Ehrigott of Portland, state organizer for the College Equal Suffrage League, held a street meeting in Moro Monday evening in the interest of Votes for Women. A goodly number gathered to hear and gave earnest attention. A partial canvas of the town reveals the fact that the women of this section are alive to this new demand for justice. Mrs Ehrigott is stopping at the county seats of Eastern Oregon counties on her way to Baker city, Huntington and the Pendleton Round-up. The Moro women will have space at the county fair where literature on equal suffrage will be distributed.

A daily Esperanto newspaper, a play performed in esperanto, and a temporary bank and postoffice whose business will be conducted entirely in the new "universal" language, were part of the features of the International Esperanto congress at Cracow last week. Visitors and delegates were in attendance from esperanto societies in England, France, Spain, Germany, Italy, Russia, the United States and a number of other countries; in point of attendance the gathering was the largest ever held by the international organization.

A recent valedictorian at a high school graduation, before departing for a theological college, confessed that his honor was won by fraud. This purging of the conscience before entering the ministry may be said to be a complementary salutatory to such a valedictory: the young man has a sense of proportion.

Senator Williams of Mississippi is in favor of limiting the presidency of the United States to two terms, and will advocate a constitutional amendment to that effect; the two term idea can be improved upon, Senator; elections are too frequent; help us to make it one term only, six or eight years.

There are 1,346,925 voting women in the six states in which unlimited suffrage is now enjoyed; that is a figure for politicians to conjure with, and the bull moose third term, the "boss politician" running this year, is the first to conjure with it.

A claim to have rejected campaign money after it has been expended is the latest and one of the queerest developments in "new nationalism."
