BRIEF NEWS OF OREGON

Clatsop county's first juvenile industrial fair was launched at Astoria Friday.

The Medford opera-house, an old landmark, burned to the ground Friday.

There have been just 14 deaths from tuberculosis so far this year in Lane county.

Eight hundred delegates are expected at the National Convention of the Woman's Christian Temperance Union, which begins in Portland Saturday morning.

DeWitt Perry of Forest Grove and Neil McFarland of Portland met death in the sub-station of the Oregon Electric railway at Hillsboro, when 90,000 volts passed through their bodies.

Slates Rich, ex-paying teller of the United States National bank of Salem, was arrested by a United States marshal in that city, charged with embezzling \$2400 from the Salem bank.

The annual meeting of the Oregon Baptist state convention is being held at Oregon City. The convention is a meeting representing the Baptist denomination throughout the state.

Miss Alice Holmes, 31 years old, was killed, and three persons injured when the automobile in which they were riding plunged over an embankment on the Linnton road, 10 miles north of Portland.

What can be accomplished with the government's aero system was demonstrated this week when the wireless operator at Astoria picked up a message from the Japanese coast, 4300 nautical miles away.

A large business deal has just been made at Hermiston, where the First National bank purchased the Hermiston Bank & Trust company, consolidating the two institutions under the name of the First National bank of Hermiston.

The Daily Capital Journal, one of the best known papers in the Willamette valley, has been sold by Colonel Hofer to L. B. Barnes of Albany and Graham P. Tabor, late of Logansport, Ind. The consideration is understood to have been \$30,000.

According to a request often made in his lifetime, the ashes of Jeremiah R. Ream, for many years a prominent business man of Albany and Eugene, were cast upon the waves of the Pacific ocean, his widow making a trip to Newport for that purpose.

With information from every county in the state as to salaries of all county officials and expense of their offices, Governor West is preparing a measure to equalize all salaries of county officials according to assessed valuation, area and population of each county.

The extension division of the Oregon Agricultural college reports an unusual demand this season for members of the college faculty and experiment station staff to judge exhibits and render other expert service at the county and grange fairs throughout the state.

The wool rate case, wherein the National Woolgrowers' association and the Oregon Woolgrowers' association are plaintiffs against 25 railroads in Oregon, has been postponed by the state railroad commission, before which the hearing was to have commenced Monday.

In a decision just handed down by the supreme court, the law passed by the Oregon legislature in 1911 regulating the branding of tub butter is declared unconstitutional, on the ground that it is class legislation.

The decision makes it possible for all persons who make butter to compete with the creameries.

Attorney General Crawford is preparing to go to Crook county to take up the suit on the bond of Sheriff McArthur, who is charged with not performing the duties of his office in connection with controlling vice conditions. Several charges have been made against him, alleging that he was in league with law violators in that county.

Governor West announces that he intends to recommend to the legislature abolition of the office of state land agent, and also superintendent of the penitentiary, both offices appointive by the governor. Recognizing the uselessness of his office, T. A. Rhinehart, present state land agent, has advised the governor that the office ought to be abolished.

The population of Portland in 1910, according to the bulletin of the census bureau, was made up of 118,868 males and 123,345 females, being a ratio of 124.5 males to each 100 females. Ten years previous, the ratio was 123.6 to each 100 females. In all Oregon in census year there were 264,385 males and 268,270 females or 125.3 males to each 100 females. In 1900 there were 229 males to each 100 females in Oregon.

A third edition of the Portland Chamber of Commerce circular, "Talk to Land in Oregon," issued in co-operation with the passenger department of the O. W. R. & N. company, has just been issued. The demand for this publication was so great that the original edition did not satisfy. The booklet contains an ample description of all the public lands in the state now available for entry under either the state or federal laws.

OREGON NEWS NOTES OF GENERAL INTEREST

Events Occurring Throughout the State During the Past Week.

Gov. Marshall to Come to Oregon.

Portland.—A telegram received by Chairman Hanes of the democratic state committee states that Governor Marshall of Indiana, candidate for vice-president, will arrive at Medford shortly after 5 o'clock in the afternoon of October 23, and the regular schedule calls for his leaving half an hour later for Portland. This would give him the whole of the next day in Portland, unless other arrangement is made.

Clatsop to Have Cheese Factories.

Astoria.—About 30 dairymen from the Clatsop Plains section held a meeting here and decided to incorporate the Clatsop County Co-operative Cheese association, with a capital stock of \$5000 to erect and operate a co-operative cheese factory at Seaside. Plans are also under way to erect one or more cheese factories in the district between Seaside and Astoria.

Huntington Has New Mayor.

Huntington.—Within the past nine months Huntington has had three different men for mayor. Mayor Northey, who resigned at the request of Governor West; J. T. Fryer, who succeeded him, and lastly, J. S. Crimmins, who was elected by the council Friday.

Bird and Mammal Collection is Gift.

Forest Grove.—A valuable addition to the zoological department of Pacific University was made when Dr. Everett, of Gaston, made a gift of his collection of birds and mammals to the university. The collection was made by Dr. Everett during his 20 years' residence in Oregon, and consists of about 35 specimens.

Newberg City Hall Destroyed by Fire.

Newberg.—The temporary city hall at Newberg was practically destroyed by fire Friday. The city's books, which were put in a safe, are believed to be unharmed, but on the recorder's desk were papers which were destroyed.

STATEMENTS ARE MAILED

Voters' Pamphlet Begins to Go Out to Distant Counties.

Salem.—Secretary of State Ben W. Olcott has commenced mailing the first of the pamphlets containing arguments and statements of political parties, which have nominated candidates and of independent candidates who have filed statements for publication.

The pamphlets are segregated into six groups, this division being made necessary on account of district candidates that have arguments in the pamphlet. The pamphlets being mailed will go to the counties of Baker, Crook, Gilliam, Grant, Harney, Hood, River, Malheur, Morrow, Sherman, Umatilla, Union, Wallowa, Wasco and Wheeler.

The second group will number about 20,000 and will go to the counties of Benton, Clackamas, Coos, Curry, Douglas, Jackson, Josephine, Lane, Lincoln and Washington.

In the third group are the counties of Linn, Marion, Polk, Tillamook and Yamhill, and the estimated registration is 25,500.

The counties of Klamath and Lake comprise the fourth group, with an estimated registration of 3240.

Clatsop and Columbia counties comprise the fifth group, and have an estimated registration of 5040.

The sixth group will go to Multnomah county, the estimated registration of which reaches 50,100.

State Teachers in Meeting.

Enterprise.—The twelfth annual convention of the Oregon State Teachers' Association, eastern division, is being held this week in Enterprise. The sessions commenced Wednesday evening and will continue until Friday.

Car Shortage Hits Shippers.

Woodburn.—The shortage of cars on the Southern Pacific system is causing great inconvenience to shippers of all kinds of produce in this section, and the situation is such that it is almost impossible to move any commodity in any quantity.

Oxford Examination at Albany.

Eugene.—In a conference between the heads of the University of Oregon and McKinninville college, Albany college was the place selected for holding of entrance examinations for the University of Oxford Rhodes scholarship.

Primogeniture.

Away back in the patriarchal ages the first born son had a superiority over all his brethren and in the absence of his father was in every important sense the head of the house. Upon the death of the father he became the lord of the family, and naturally he fell the property as well as the honors of the household. Primogeniture wherever it is found today is the lingering remnant of the ancient custom, a custom which common sense and justice pronounce to be as unfair as it is superstitious.

A SUMMARY OF IMPORTANT EVENTS

National, Political and Personal News Items Briefly Sketched.

During the first nine months of this year 51,546 babies were born in Chicago.

The missionary societies of America have just reported that their gifts exceeded \$12,000,000 during the year 1911.

Reports received by railroads operating westward from Chicago indicate that the winter travel this fall will be much heavier than a year ago.

Nearly 30,000,000 bushels of wheat were produced in the Pacific northwest this season, by far the greatest harvest in the history of the three states.

Mexican rebels have given warning that all American railroad men captured while operating trains in certain portions of Mexico after October 15 will be shot.

The October crop report of the department of agriculture, just issued, shows that spring wheat, oats, barley, rye and hay have all exceeded the best record production, while the crops of corn and potatoes also will be the greatest ever when harvested.

A great hunger strike by women throughout Great Britain is the latest move leading suffragettes propose to initiate if the government continues to ignore the suffragettes' demands during the parliamentary session just begun. It is proposed to commence the strike on December 25.

More than a score of cases of unusual consequence are on the docket for an early hearing before the supreme court of the United States, which convened Monday for its fall term. The cases include those of the anthracite coal trust, the Union Pacific-Southern Pacific merger, the Interstate Commerce cases, the Kansas election case, the cotton corner case, the suit to dissolve the bath tub trust, the Louisville and Nashville rate case, and several cases involving the interstate commerce laws.

Political News Bits

Speaker Clark and Governor Wilson traveled together and spoke from the same platform in Illinois and Missouri. In a six day automobile trip through New England the past week, President Taft made short speeches at several of the towns visited.

Grove L. Johnson, a veteran Republican, prominent politician of California, and father of Governor Johnson, has come out strongly for Wilson for president, giving as his reason the theft of the Republican ticket by the Roosevelt Progressives.

Leaders of the various political parties in New York are consulting their attorneys as to the legality of the practice of passing the hat at political meetings without making notes of the names of the contributors. It is charged that the practice is a violation of the state election laws. The practice is being followed by the Socialists and the Roosevelt Progressives.

Dan R. Hanna, backer of the Roosevelt forces in Ohio, told the senate campaign contributions committee that he gave \$177,000 to the support of the Roosevelt campaign for nomination this year. The expenses of the fight of Speaker Clark for the Democratic nomination were \$50,463, of which Senator Watson of West Virginia gave \$10,700, and W. R. Hearst \$9500.

People in the News

Attorneys for the prosecution and defense have agreed to postpone the beginning of the second trial of Clarence S. Darrow until October 31.

William A. Pfeffer, ex-United States senator from Kansas and a conspicuous figure in political life 20 years ago, is dead at Topeka, aged 81 years.

William Lorimer, deceased senator from Illinois, declares he is going to devote the rest of his life, it necessary, to an effort to vindicate himself before the American people.

Barrique Mass, a Cuban newspaper man, who recently assaulted Hugh S. Gibson, the American charge d'affaires at Havana, has been sentenced to two and a half years' imprisonment.

General Pascual Orozco, who has eluded the Mexican federal forces for several weeks, has been located with 2000 followers on the Rio Grande, an American property, 90 miles south of the border.

Julius Lumbard, a famous singer of Civil War days, died at Chicago in his eighty-eighth year. Lumbard sang the requiem at Lincoln's grave in Springfield during the funeral service for the emancipator.

Declaring that capital punishment had no more place in the present day order than the burning of witches, Governor Hunt of Arizona has granted reprieves to William Campbell, Eduardo Perez, N. M. Chavez and Miguel Peralta, all of whom were to have been hanged.

REASONS FOR WOMAN SUFFRAGE

Women must obey the laws and pay taxes just as men do. They suffer as much from bad government as do the men. Therefore, they should vote on equal terms with men. Mothers who want to make their children's surroundings better and women of leisure who attempt to serve the public welfare should be able to support their advice by their vote.

Women are consumers but in addition to that, over 20,000,000 women in the United States are wage earners and their health and that of their future generations are being ruined by evil working conditions that can only be remedied by legislation. Both consumers and producers need fuller representation in politics.

In the states where women have enjoyed municipal suffrage, the verdict of the voters has been that women are public-spirited and take an intelligent interest in public affairs. Would Oregon women do less than these?

RESULTS OF WOMAN SUFFRAGE
Women are only forty-two per cent of the population of Colorado, but they cast fifty-five per cent of the vote of the state.

In Denver the women cast fifty-five per cent of the vote in the large primary ward and only four per cent in the "slush" wards.

There is no nation, no state, no city that has enfranchised women where the vote of the respectable women even remotely approaches that of the women of good repute. Almost 50,000 women voted at the last election in Denver. Of these only 400 could be connected with any bad element.

In the states where women were first enfranchised and where ninety per cent of the women vote regularly, there is a larger percentage of married women than in any other state except Idaho, also a suffrage state, while divorce in Wyoming is only one-eighth as great as in the states where women do not vote. Equal suffrage builds up rather than disrupts the home.

Another suffrage state, Utah, has the largest proportion of home owners of any state in the Union.

In Seattle there were never a hundred women devoting themselves to the suffrage campaign, but 35,000 women registered at the first election. Thirty per cent of the women voting in the last election in Seattle were married—the women of the home.

In the Los Angeles election of 1911, when practically the entire adult population voted, there were approximately 70,000 women who registered and cast their ballots. They actually cast their ballots in many wards outnumbering the men.
