In Memory of Henry Hennagin.

Henry Hennagin was born in St. Lawrence county, New York, January 22d, 1851, and died at his home in Linn county, Oregon, 3 1/2 miles east of Corvallis, October 16th, 1912, aged 61 years, 9 months and 24 days.

Brother Hennagin was converted, and united with the church 21 years ago last July, at a Methodist camp meeting held near Rutledge in this county, and remained an active member in the church until his death.

He was also one of the pioneer homesteaders of Sherman county, and spent a number of the active years of his life here, and at Hood River, and in the Willamette valley, being a sufferer from Bright's disease, for about 16 years, and moved from place to place as his health seemed to require, but for many years has regarded Sherman county as his home, and at his personal request his remains were brought here for burial on the 18th. The funeral service was conducted from the home of his son Frederick, Mountain View farm, on the 19th, by W L Dillinger, assisted by W C Johnson of Moro M. E. church, and the remains were laid to rest by the side of his first wife in Rose cemetery.

He leaves a wife, nine children two step children, and a number of grand children, to mourn his death. Sister Hennagin and family have the sympathy of all their neighbors and friends in their sad bereavement.
