BRIEF NEWS OF OREGON

H. T. West has shipped 3200 sheep from Enterprise to the eastern markets. Mr. West paid \$4.65 a hundred pounds for the sheep.

The net income of the Great North Sea Railway company for the past year was \$20,903,924.06, according to its annual report, filed with the railroad commission.

After a lapse of several months since the Morning Star ceased publication, La Grande is soon to have an up-to-date morning paper. It is to be known as the Morning Examiner.

Ten thousand people from all parts of the Willamette valley gathered at Eugene and joined that city in the celebration of the completion of the Oregon electric railway from Portland to Eugene.

G. W. Nutter, an aged resident of the Clatsop Plains district, dropped dead in the railroad depot at Warrenton. Mr. Nutter was 88 years old, a native of New York and came to the coast in 1849.

Articles of Incorporation have been filed at Salem by the Oregon Pacific & Eastern Railway company, with a capitalization of \$1,000,000. The object is to build a railroad from the mouth of Umpqua river to Cottage Grove.

Charged with appropriating bank funds to his own use and making false entries on the books of the Citizens National bank of Baker, of which he was formerly cashier, Guy L. Lindsay has been indicted and placed under \$10,000 bonds.

That it is not criminal trespass to hunt upon uninclosed or unimproved lands, even though trespass notices are posted, is the substance of an opinion by Attorney General Crawford. The statute provides that criminal trespass only holds on inclosed lands.

Hood River will for this year abandon the holding of the annual apple show. This action is because the apple crop is so large this season that growers do not have time to prepare for exhibits in view of the lateness of the season for the harvesting of the crop.

Appropriations in round numbers by the 1911 legislature were \$5,500,000, with \$1,924,000 divided among the state institutions proper, not including educational institutions. This is a statement given out by Governor West preparatory to the issuance of the budget for the next legislature.

Valuation of property in Multnomah county on which the 1913 tax levy will be based, not including the valuation of franchises and railroads which is fixed by the state tax commission, totals \$306,906,095, as against \$285,400,820 for last year, or an increase of \$21,505,275.

Imports received in the Portland custom house districts during the quarter terminating September 30 were valued at \$909,258, those on which duties were paid being worth \$537,266, and those entered free being appraised at \$371,992. The value of the exports for the three months was \$1,885,861.

Governor West announces that at the next meeting of the state land board he will ask it to instruct the attorney general to bring suit against Benson & Hyde, the timber operators who during their operations in the state acquired from it about 50,000 acres of state land, to have them revert to the state on the ground of fraud.

Total recommendations for appropriations of superintendents of the state institutions to the next legislative assembly, exclusive of the cost of the Oregon branch asylum, will be \$1,448,981, or \$64,549.35 more than the appropriations which were made for the same institutions in 1911. So far there has been appropriated \$350,000 for the asylum at Pendleton.

Winter supplies for Walla Walla county sheep men, whose herds pass the cold months on Snake river, will be taken in by the all water route from Portland. The goods will go up the Columbia river, up the Snake to Lewiston by regular boats and thence to destination on the gasoline craft Prospector, which has been running on the upper river since early summer.

After a controversy continuing for nearly a year over what disposition should be made of the balance in the fund raised last year by a special levy of 2 1/2 mills "to exploit the resources of Clatsop county during the centennial celebration," the centennial committee has decided to bring suit against Clatsop county for \$4226.03, the amount remaining in the fund.

Declaring the per capita cost of the state tuberculosis sanatorium at Salem to be too high, and that the institution is too heavy, the state board has sent out a letter to each of the members of the tuberculosis board recommending that the institution be abolished, that the patients be put in care of private establishments, and that the building be converted into a home for wayward girls—an institution they think has long been a need of the state.

OREGON NEWS NOTES OF GENERAL INTEREST

Events Occurring Throughout the State During the Past Week.

School Association Formed in Coos.
Coquille—The Coos County High School association met at Coquille Friday, representatives being present from Marshfield, North Bend, Myrtle Point, Bandon and Coquille. Officers were elected and a schedule was made out for the athletic and literary contests of the year. Superintendent A. T. Park of Myrtle Point was elected president to succeed Superintendent F. A. Tiedgen of Marshfield.

Forest Fire Burns Over 400 Acres.
Medford—The biggest forest fire of the year and a small one at that has just been extinguished in the Thompson creek district. In all 400 acres, mostly brush and second growth trees, were burned over. It is seldom there is a forest fire so late in the year. The fire loss here this season is almost nothing.

Officers Suspended for Clubbing Man.
Eugene—Accused of unnecessarily beating a man over the head in an attempt to arrest him, night Chief of Police George Morris and Officer Clark, of the local police force, were suspended by Mayor Berger, after an investigation of the case by the police committee of the council.

SCIENTIFIC FARMS LEAD

Experiment Station Crops Big and of High Grade.

Corvallis—That the scientific methods of farming followed at the three eastern Oregon branch experiment stations are extremely practical and have been as largely responsible as have been the unusually favorable weather conditions, for the splendid showing made this year by station crops, is the opinion of Professor H. D. Scudder of Oregon Agricultural college, who has just returned from a trip of inspection covering the experiment stations in Sherman, Crook and Harney counties.

The evidence upon which Professor Scudder bases his opinion is the fact that the crops raised at the experiment stations, yielded on the average 20 to 30 per cent larger crops than have been taken this season from other fields in the same localities.

Professor Scudder reports that eastern Oregon farmers are having such success with corn, field peas, alfalfa and Turkey red wheat as to indicate a promising future for these crops in the dry farming belt.

Aeroplane Blow Fatal to Man.
Prineville—Stewart Crane, who was struck by an aeroplane on the grounds of the central Oregon fair here during a flight by S. Christofferson of Portland has died as a result of his injuries. Mr. Crane was 68 years old and the shock of the injury was too great.

Portland Breaks Registration Records.
Portland—All registration records for Multnomah county were shattered when the registration books closed, \$1,754 votes being made eligible to vote at the general election November 5. Of these 1585 waited until the closing day.

REGISTRATION IS HIGH

State Voters May Total 147,000 Mark is Estimate.

Salem—Registration, which closes next Saturday, probably will reach as high as 147,000, according to a close estimate which was prepared by Secretary Olooff. The registration before the primaries was 131,530. This is an increase of about 15,000 since that time. The registration before the general election in 1910 was 122,745 and in 1908 was 122,095. The increase of 1910 over 1908 was slight, but this year the increase over 1910 will be about 24,000.

The largest increase of any of the counties since the primaries, that is percentage of increase and not in actual numbers, probably will be in Lane county, where it is estimated there will be an increase of 25 per cent.

Month-Old Child's Leg Amputated.
Roseburg—A rare case in medical science was brought to notice here when doctors amputated below the knee the leg of a one-month-old infant. The child was affected with gangrene in the lower left leg.
