### For Your Scrap Book.

If you are so unfortunate as not  
to have a scrap book we can fur-  
nish you one at The Observer Book  
Store.

Sausage time is near by and a  
few hints may be found useful. To  
every 12-lbs. of meat take three  
table spoonfuls of salt, three of  
black pepper, six of powdered  
sage, and one of red pepper;  
grind the meat through the mill  
then mix in the seasoning thoroly  
and let it stand an hour, then grind  
again, stuff, and hang in a dry,  
cool place. After they hang a  
week or ten days, or until the skins  
are dry, take them down, rub well  
with corn meal and place in a box  
with brown-paper between each  
layer. Sausage may also be kept  
fresh if fried, placed in jars and  
covered with the drippings; if not  
sufficient make up the deficiency  
with melted lard; keep the jars  
well covered, in a cool place.
