Cold Weather Observations

A cold snap hit Sherman county last week and is still with us. Information supplied by Superintendent D. E. Stephens, of the federal and state experiment station, show that for five days beginning February 5th the average maximum temperature during that time was less than 25 degrees above while during the same time the average minimum temperature was 7 degrees above; Monday the 10th the average maximum was 31 degrees above; but again Tuesday was colder. The experiment station has also a self registering electric thermograph which, during the time under discussion, showed that the temperature of the earth six inches under the surface was ranging from 40 to 50 degrees above. The cold snap has seemed to be more severe than the mercury has indicated by reason of an east breeze which has blown almost constantly.

The roads before this cold came upon us were very muddy and now are hard and rough for travel. There has been no complaint as to scarcity of feed for stock and all kinds are wintering nicely, and will likely go through the winter in tip top shape.

Mr. Stephen also informs us that if the winter sown grain over the county generally is in as good condition as that of the experiment station it will winter in good condition; that before this cold spell an examination of the fields showed that the most of the grain were above ground, that all had sprouted and while this weather was cold, in his opinion, it was not hurting the wheat sown as yet.
