The market price of hogs at the stock yards in Portland continues to go up, and up; and than another up.

The king of Greece was assassinated the afternoon of March 18th by a Greek subject in the city of Saloniki, captured in the war from the Turks.

According to a recent ruling of the post office department business houses and private citizens can send parcel post packages special delivery. Packages so stamped will now go the same as letter mail.

Farmers near St. Paul, Oregon, have formed a co-operative creamery association. There is a broad field for farmers in this state to make common cause with their neighbors in marketing their products and results are bound to be mutually profitable.

The industrious California lady-bug, which does nothing but eat, but does that with discrimination, is in demand every where as an exterminator of pests that infest vegetables. Germany and New Zealand have made application to the state commission for consignments of the little bugs. Millions of them are sent each year to melon growers with the demand for them increasing. Their home is in the California redwood forest.

The average political mathematician is busy figuring where he is at since the legislature adjourned; the latest from the governor's office is that state taxes next year will be three and a half times larger than this year, which is true. But those on the inside know that the governor and the state board have whittled and pruned and cut until state institutions were in financial distress, for no other reason than to have a remarkably low state tax levy this year; of course they never expected the legislature to appropriate funds by which a comparison might be arrived at between different factions politically and different sections of the state socially.

An effort will be made in the next federal congress to repeal the free tolls clause in the Panama canal law and at the same time to pass an act authorizing establishment of a government owned line of steamers, as a freight and passenger rate regulator, to run between New York and Atlantic coast ports and Pacific coast ports, including Portland. It is proposed to spend \$10,000,000 for eight steamers to be operated by the Panama railway, which is owned in turn by the United States. About the time they are built another bill will be introduced to sell the railway for a song and also incidentally the steamers.

Senator W. H. Ragsdale is at home again after his first experience as a member of the state legislature. He says that it is an experience worth the time and trouble and expense; that very few men are broad minded enough to go through a session without becoming entangled in trades and log rolling by which to secure results which their constituents desire. Mr. Ragsdale says that it is an educational effort that is simply amazing to an onlooker to first read the platform upon which some legislators were elected and then take up the legislative journals and read their records of daily voting upon men, measures, and appropriations.

The credit or discredit of changing the conditions affecting the sale of liquor in Moro will lie with the women of this city, whether they take an active part or not; and, also, whether they participate in the voting. It cannot be said that this city needs the license money as the councilmen now in office have, in the last seven years, paid off virtually all warrant indebtedness as well as providing better streets and more water supply. It is a peculiar coincidence that the question comes up with the first occasion of women voting at a city election in Moro.

Encouraged by the success of its initial performance, the Pacific northwest land products show will hold a second and larger exposition of soil wealth next fall. An organization for the coming show has been formed and officers elected. The dates are for the week of November 1 to 8. Exhibits of both fruits and vegetables are wanted, and farmers are being urged to plant their crops this year with the idea of placing their best on display in Portland and competing for the many prizes offered.

Under a new law enacted by the last legislature district attorneys no longer hold office hereafter the work is done by each county having a county attorney. District Attorney Starr, by virtue of the new law, is county attorney of Wheeler county; T. A. Weinkie has been appointed by Governor West as county attorney for Gilliam county, and Sherman county has its appointment hanging fire.

Theodore Roosevelt's daughter, Miss Ethel, will be married at the Oyster Bay family home Friday April 4th to Dr. Richard Derby, a New York dentist. The wedding will lack the splendor that attended that of her sister Alice to Congressman Longworth, but Alice same Ethel has corralled a man with a pull.

Among other improvements at the county fair grounds this year will be a new barn to house the sheep and hog exhibits; the building will be 48x100 feet in size and built at the side of the barn now used for the horse exhibits.
