The Question of "Wet or Dry."

A lady from out of town has asked us to oppose through the Observer the wet side of the liquor question to be voted on April 7th. The Observer does not care to get into the middle of the street and take an exhorting, shouting side on this question. Personally the management has the opinion that under no circumstance does Moro need saloon, "friends" of the city claim that merchants will benefit by increased trade if saloons are voted in; but better stocks and possibly better prices will get the trade, and nothing else. We remember that a dozen years ago the better class of farmers joined in promising their trade to this city "if you down the saloon" it was done, but the trade still goes other places; some of it to Chicago mail order houses that do not pay their women help half enough to live on, as testified to before the Illinois vice commission. But as long as it is "cheaper" Moro merchants will not get the trade, saloon or no saloon.

The snow this week was fine for the crops of Sherman county. The universal weather man, Jupiter Pluvius, simply had to keep at it until he had unloaded a plentiful supply of the beautiful by the morning of Tuesday, March 25th, possibly the latest day of winter that any resident of Sherman county had seen snow fall; certainly no one in this county had ever seen such a storm come after Easter Sunday at any other time of their life. Preceding the storm was a week of very low temperature, averaging from 12 to 20 above zero. Tuesday night the temperature dropped to 5 above.

One of the newly enfranchised voters of Moro want us to correct the prevalent erroneous idea that if saloons are voted in more sidewalks will be built and present ones kept in better repair. She considered that assertion as good as gospel until she discovered that property owners have always paid for sidewalks and the keeping them in repair. Under the charter the city pays only for crossings. Past practice has been to neglect repairs and to take a chance at the city being sued for not forcing property owners to keep walks in order as can be done under the charter.

CORRESPONDENCE.

Having heard it expressed by some of our citizens who should be better informed, that a well regulated saloon would be a benefit to our town, and that it would enable us to have better walks and street improvements, and also "drive away the blind pigs" we take this occasion to explode a popular fallacy. Mr. Citizen, if your walks are repaired you have to pay for it yourself, not the city; the license money is needed to take care of the inebriate and disorderly. We must learn not to "do evil that good may come" and it is very doubtful if any good can arise from licensing a public nuisance.

The government is becoming embarrassed with the wholesale resignations of fourth class postmasters of the country. Some 2000 have quit and more are resigning at the rate of twenty a day. Caused by the requirement of a competitive civil examination.

A letter from the state superintendent informs us that every railroad in Oregon will join next fall in carrying freight charges free, all school childrens exhibits for the state fair. Every child in Oregon is now on equal terms to compete at the state-fair for some of the many prizes.

The Niagara, Commodore Perry's second flagship in the battle of lake Erie a century ago, has been raised from beneath the waters to take part in the centenary commemoration of the American victory over the British. The vessel is only 110 feet long and in remarkably good condition. She would be only a tender to the modern steamship of today.

The consensus of opinion seems to favor the theory that the late cold weather will not materially affect the fall sown wheat. There has been some reseeding this spring, but the cause for that seems to be that the seed was drilled too deep and the grain either rotted before sprouting or the surface crusted and not being broken the tender grain could not penetrate the heavy crust.
