Next dinner was served and the tables fairly groaned beneath the load of good things to eat. Preaching at 3 in the afternoon and at the close of the service seven children were baptised. A glorious time was reported by all present.

ELECTION DAY AT MORO.

The City Continues to Remain "Dry" Ticket Elected as Nominated.

The largest vote ever cast at a city election in Moro was that of this month. A total of 119 votes were cast, 56 by women, with but one defective ballot; presumably by a man as the evident intention was a vote for the town to go "wet." There were a scattering vote of five, the balance voting a preference on every candidate and measure.

J. C. Freeman, for mayor, received 114; for councilman for two year term L. Barnum 113, O. A. Ramsey 114, F. A. Sayrs 111. A determined fight centered upon the election of W. C. Rutledge for councilman for one year, he receiving 56 votes and O. B. Messenger, put up against him, receiving 51 votes.

The determination of "wet" or "dry" seemed to surprise the advocates of prohibition more than it did their opponents as the vote counted 88 in favor of a "dry" town and only 26 in favor of the town going "wet." Before election day considerable ill feeling was aroused in the city over the actions of some who should have been better informed, asserting that certain ones would vote and work for the city going "wet." The only excuse for their words and action is that they had certainly forgotten all ever taught them regarding the Golden Rule.

Nearly all the women voting quietly went to the polls, cast their ballot and returned home. They had a preference and made it their business to see that it was properly recorded. The first voter was C. L. Montgomery, followed by three other men voters before the women realized that an honor of being among the first was swiftly passing. Then the van guard of women voters began recording their preference; Mrs. Essie Johnson being first, Mrs. Julia W. Hansen, second and Mrs. Alda Fagan third. Mrs. Alberta Sheets was the last woman to vote.

Fourteen voters were sworn in; seven women and seven men.

The election board was J. M. Axtell, Wm. Morrison, and Mrs. Julia W. Hansen, judges; Mrs. Essie Johnson and Mrs. George E. Lewellen, clerks. There were one or two ballots cast by parties who are not residents of the city and the probabilities are very great that they do not intend to become residents.

The Tri-County Fair at Moro.

H. C. Oliver, of the O. W. R. & N. Co., was a visitor in the county this week in the interest of the Tri-County Fair this fall. A meeting of the representative citizens of the county at Moro Tuesday evening appointed a committee of ten to meet at Moro with committees from the counties of Gilliam and Morrow and finally determine whether to hold such a fair this year. It will need more than \$2000 to finance the undertaking and Sherman county wants to know whether she is expected to do it all; an endeavor will be made for the other counties to use their county state fair monies as one general fund. The committee for this county is G. N. Crofield and E. D. McKee, Wasco; L. W. Baker and C. A. Buckley, Grass Valley; J. K. Irby and L. J. Gates, Kent; W. H. Ragsdale, L. Barnum, W. C. Bryant, W. F. Jackson, Moro.
