J. W. Case has certainly turned out a fine piece of work in the re-finishing and painting of C. R. Belshee auto. When work is done as thoroughly as this it is an investment as all rust spots are treated and prevented from further injuring the car.

While trying to drive an unruly mare from the barn on E. H. Moore farm south of town Roy Kunsman nearly lost the sight of his right eye by the shot whip he was using becoming tangled and reacting upon him instead of the animal for which it was intended. Dr. Nason has charge of the case and it is expected that after a short rest Roy will have as good an optic as he had before the accident.

Two state Sunday School conventions are to be held in the state this week, one at Baker City in the eastern part of Oregon and the other at Oregon City. Both are practically the same convention, divided so the expense of delegates in attending could be reduced. To clean a badly burnt pan, granite or other ware, put into it a teaspoonful of baking soda, fill with water, cover it and let it boil for half an hour. The burnt stuff will flake off, leaving the pan clean and wholly uninjured.

A Umatilla county farmer is running a Holt caterpillar engine drawing three three-bottom gang plows 24 hours a day with a double crew. The outfit has averaged sixty acres complete a day. Seven miles from Monmouth another Holt caterpillar is at work drawing eight plows and a drill. This is something new for the Willamette valley and averages 16 acres a day of 12 hours.

There has been remarkable records of the actual flights of birds, but a recent record surpasses all that had previously been known. An adult swallow was captured not long ago in Natal that was marked with a tag attached to it in England. This indicated that it had traversed a distance of at least 7000 miles on the wing. Of course there's no telling what additional distance it may have covered beside the airline from Great Britain to South Africa.
