Weather Conditions of Last Week

A regular feature of The Observer; data supplied by Superintendent D. E. Stephens, state and federal experiment farm station, Moro, Oregon.

The week of July 14th to 20th was the hottest of the year, the average maximum temperature being 11 degrees higher than the preceding week.

Maximum temperature for the week was 100.5 degrees on the 20th. The minimum temperature for the night of the 20th was only 76.

Minimum temperature during the week was 48 on the night of the 14th.

The highest temperature recorded at the experiment station during the year 1912 was 98 on July 16th; and during the year 1911, 103 on July 15th.
