A. J. Syron has sold his farming interests to Dayton Henrichs who will take possession of the farm under lease about September first. Mr. Syron has purchased an interest in the Moro Hardware and Implement company and expects to buy property and move into town as soon as Dayton will take over the farm.

Sparks from the engine of the DesChutes O. W. R. & N. Co. train set a grass fire near Sherman station July 26th that burned over 150 acres bunch grass pasture and four acres of standing wheat on the Burt Watkins farm. Wheat from the field burned is averaging between 20 and 30 bushels of No. 1 wheat to the acre.

Moro became a dry town so far as gasoline was concerned last Sunday. The Moro Garage has had an order in for more gasoline the last fourteen days but Portland was also dry and not even a barrel could be had from there. When ever gasoline is received in Portland an order for twenty barrels will be shipped to the Moro Garage.

W. C. Rees has sold his lease upon the 480 acre farm which he had been operating in the Upper Hay Canon county to T. J. Hinkle, a former resident of Sherman county and brother to Mrs. A. C. Thompson. Mr. Hinkle has purchased the summer fallow, farm implements and stock and will have possession of the place by October first. Mr. Rees will harvest the present crop and then move to his own farm a mile and a half from Friend in Wasco county.

Harvest is now in full swing in Sherman county. The warm weather of two weeks ago, followed by a more equable temperature of the last few weeks have ripened the grain in the northern part of the county to an extent that will permit harvesting machinery to begin work. In the southern part of the county wheat fields are still green in places, but that section is generally a few weeks later than the most forward northern part of Sherman county. The average expectation of fall sown grain is in the neighborhood of ten to twelve sacks to the acre. The spring sown grain will come considerably under that estimate.

GETTYSBURG VETERAN RETURNS.

The shipments have been held during the hot weather as shrinkage in weight is expensive when indulged in by the car load. Two cars of cattle were shipped from Moro by Daniel Stewart and one car of hogs by C. R. Belshie. A car of cattle was shipped by Walker Bros. from Grass Valley.

This year Mr. Thompson varied the monotony of the trip by driving a pair of Shetland ponies, only 42 inches high, from his Long Beach home to as far as The Dalles where he sold the team.
