D. W. Wade, county agent for the Pacific Coast Elevator company, was in Moro Tuesday on business connected with the operation of the company warehouse at this place, for this season.

Eugene Amidon was the owner of the first wheat to be hauled into Moro this season. It was from a 75 acre field of turkey red that produced 1370 sacks, better than 42 bushels to the acre. His other wheat has averaged close to 15 sacks an acre.

A.M. Wright has returned from a visit with his mother at Eugene. Since the recent death of Mr. Wright's father Mrs. Wright has been in very poor health. It is the intention of Mr. Wright to have his mother remove to Sherman county as soon as cooler weather will permit.

Hon. Chas. W. Moore of The Dalles has purchased the brick building now occupied by the Moro Hardware and Implement company from L. Barnum. Part of the consideration was the transfer of stock held by Mr. Moore in the Citizens Commercial Company at Grass Valley to Mr. Barnum, this giving Mr. Barnum a controlling interest in that company.

A new change in train schedules on the main line of the O.W.R. & N. Co., went into effect August 3d. The running time between Chicago and Portland has been cut to 72 hours; and a new train has been put on between Portland and Salt Lake City, leaving at 12:30 midnight. No changes in schedule affecting the movements of local trains were announced.

Judge John Fulton, V.H. Anderson and George N. Crosfield will leave soon for the vicinity of La-Grande to study the harvesting methods in force there with what is known as the push binder, a machine built like a header and operates like a self binder; allowing the grain to be cut slightly green and ripen in the stack. By that means overcoming the liability of the wheat shattering.

At the present time a farmer near Oregon City, is harvesting a crop probably not grown by any other rancher in Oregon—teasels. His present crop consists of about 70 acres and during the harvest season he will employ about 40 hands at \$2.50 to \$3.00 per day. The teasel is a bur for which the manufacturers of cloth find a use in raising the nap of the goods, a process for which no inventor has ever been able to invent a mechanical substitute.

W.H. Ragdale had as his guests Saturday on an auto trip through the southern part of the county D.E. Stephens of the Experiment Farm and C.W. Warborton, of the agricultural department at Washington, D.C. The trip was for the purpose of allowing Mr. Warborton to receive a first hand information as to the agricultural possibilities of Sherman county, he being connected with the division of the department specializing in the cultivation of oats and their different treatment for best results.

Mrs. Margaret Rutledge of Ellensburg, Washington, who has been visiting at the home of her son, W. C. Rutledge at the Moro Hotel, was called home very suddenly last week by the serious illness of her favorite grandchild. The little fellow passed away before her arrival home, the funeral being held that day. Mr. Rutledge accompanied his mother to their Ellensburg home.

**Weather Report for Last Week.**

A regular feature of The Observer; data supplied by Superintendent D.E. Stephens, state and federal experiment farm station, Moro, Oregon.

For the week ending August 2d Moderate temperature prevailed during the first three days of week. Since July 31, however, the temperature was above 90 every day, 99 degrees being reached on August 1, which was the highest temperature recorded during the week. The hot weather was accompanied by easterly winds, causing excessive evaporation, and doing some damage to late spring wheats and to corn. The total rainfall for the month of July has been only .06 inch.

**Backing Horses Stolen.**

Three of the most famous backing horses in the world belonging to the Pendleton Round Up have been stolen from a pasture where 100 head of horses belonging to the association are being kept. The three missing horses are "Angle" the famous outlaw on which L. W. Gibson made his championship ride last year, "Whistling Annie" who made Tex McCleod bite the dust and "Rambolling Sam" a hard bucker. The Round Up association is offering a reward of \$100 each for the return of these horses before the date of the show this year which is September 11, 12 and 13.
