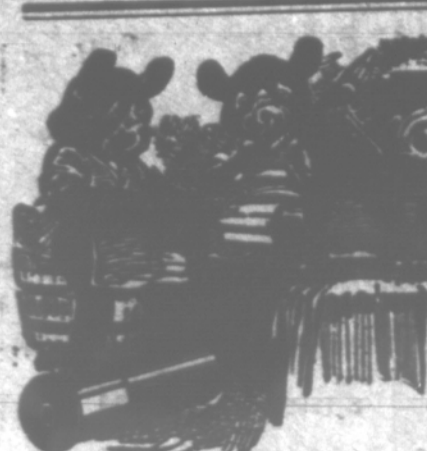

British capitalists will put \$10,000,000 into a new gulf coast road in Texas, which is another reminder that the Panama Canal has entered the general business situation.

Uncle Sam's forest rangers require that permanent camp sites within the forest shall be kept in sanitary condition. The ubiquitous tin can must be buried, and waste paper burned when a camp is left.

The first time in air boating that one air ship towed another was last week in England when an army airship became disabled and a navy airship placed a towing rope on it and towed it to its factory home for repairs.

The French war department have begun to place armor on their air ships and have placed the speed of their ships at not less than 60 miles an hour and in some cases the air boats have to make better than 80 miles at the lowest and from that to no limit.

When reading about the continuing decline in the number of cattle in the United States it is well to bear in mind and considered in connection that the increase in population of this country averages more than 1,600,000 yearly; which has its influence on the price to be received by any one who a few years from now has a good herd of cattle.

Canada authorities, puzzled as to the outcome in the Thaw case, are now getting a sample of American law in their own hall-ways and it does not seem to set any too well with them. Several automobiles, a yacht, a horse and buggy, as well as a bunch of lawyers have figured in the outing of Harry Thaw; it is the most expensive vacation trip of the summer.

A bill has been introduced in the United States senate designed to prevent the use of outside money in a doubtful state during an election; or the use of money secured outside the state in the use of pre-convention campaign work. The bill permits a national committee to pay expenses of speaking campaigns, advertisements marked paid for and other specified items, but would prohibit the general interstate movement of campaign funds.

Seattle merchants have struck a new business stunt that pleases them immensely as to its practical workings. They make up a good sized imposing parcel, place a receipted bill inside with nothing else to keep it company, and then send it by parcel post C.O.D. When the post man delivers, the person addressed must pay all charges, which is nearly always done. The game reminds the Observer publisher of the time he lived in Astoria when that town had as many saloons as all other business concerns numbered combined; a bible student out to sell the Good Book got the name of all the saloon keepers in the town, went to Portland and sent them bibles by express C.O.D. The town was flooded with bibles as well as profanity when the trick had worked to its capacity. The Seattle post office authorities have appealed to Washington to permit them to deny the mails to collectors c. o. d.

George N. Crosfield is always ready to do some thing to bring the county of Sherman to the attention of the general public. His latest effort is a letter written to the automobile club at Portland in an endeavor to have them use the new John Day grade, just completed by the county court, in place of going around by way of Shaniko when they make their overland trip to the Pendleton Round Up. In his letter to the automobile club he said: "The new grade, in no place, has over 11 per cent and in most places 6 to 8 1/2 per cent and is a credit to any county in the state of Oregon, doing away with one place on the old grade that is 31 per cent." Mr. Crosfield also said in his letter that Judge John Fulton is preparing to oil the new county road, just ordered opened, through the Vic Andersen farm at his personal expense.

Oregon stands today in the front rank of militia sharp shooters of the United States and very nearly in first place over the army and navy; having beaten the crack team of the infantry corps and also forty competing teams from other states at the national sharp shooters contest at Camp Perry, Ohio, held by the United States military authorities. The Oregon militia men's score was 2605; the U.S. navy was 2655; the U.S. cavalry score, and winner, 2675.

At the Klamath Falls last week was held the fourth annual convention of the Central Oregon Development League, the most important and interesting meeting in the history of the organization. Delegates were in attendance from all sections of eastern, central and southern Oregon as well as a number of prominent Portlanders who are interested in the development of the state. The next meeting of the league will be a year hence at Bend.

Franklin K. Lane, secretary of the interior, has visited Oregon in his official capacity and has proceeded on his way to other sections of his great field where worries and troubles are as insistent as in this state. His stay in Oregon, brief though it was, has left hundreds of homesteaders and settlers with lighter hearts and a renewed courage to tackle the obstacles to their future progress which before his coming, seemed insurmountable.

The state tax commissioners are trying to work up sentiment over the state by which the tax gathering laws will be changed and all taxes be due, payable, and delinquent in the fall of each year. Taxes have to be paid some time, might as well in the fall as any other time; but to make the change from fall to spring will make the tax payers dig twice in one year. Either that or the public officials would have to be paid in discounted warrants and the public pay the interest the warrants would earn.

The state press association will meet in Portland this year, October 17 and 18. A nation wide movement will at that time be inaugurated to erect a monument to the memory of Homer Davenport at Silverton cemetery. The Silverton band, made famous by the cartoonist, will be in attendance at the meeting of the association.
