

Every little movement has a meaning of its own, so ran that one time favorite song; every quarter cent advance in gasoline helps the autoists contribute towards the five million income tax assessment levied upon Poor John D.

After this year, when the housewife buys a crate of berries, she will know that in one respect at least every buyer of berries are placed upon the same footing; that is under a new state law all berry boxes and crates must be uniform. To conform to the law berry box manufacturers met in Portland last week and adopted uniform sizes for both what are known as the pint and quart berry hallock, which also carried with it a readjustment of the size of the crate.

California is now advertising another record. This time it is Stockton which comes to the front by claiming its school children do not average a bath more than once in five months. The health board is trying to find a remedy. Possibly a hose and good water pressure would do the work. One California paper suggests that the teachers give their pupils baths as reward for good work and deportment; it neglected to say whether by personal application or not.

The railroad owned shipping interests of England and America are trying to disrupt the century old friendly understanding between this country and England by encouraging the building of another Panama canal, with the help of moral support from the English government and the borrowed money by Colombia. It is not likely that any country will risk \$300,000,000 or more dollars and a war with the United States merely to try to obtain a change of canal regulations and assuage the vengeful feelings of a South American republic.

If doubt remains as to the advisability of refusing the use of the Panama canal to American or foreign ships, railroad owned, should be set at rest by the latest news that the Hamburg-American, one of the largest ship owning concerns in the world, is having bids prepared for the building of three modern American built steamers to be manned entirely by American crews and to run exclusively between the Atlantic and Pacific coast. The steamers will be 500 feet long, steam better than 20 miles an hour and have accommodations for 500 cabin and 1700 steerage passengers. Another steamship company, the American Hawaiian, has made the announcement that they will have a steamer going each way through the canal every 36 hours. The Hamburg-American company was one of those back of the effort of the English government to abolish the railroad owned ruling from the Panama canal regulations; the American-Hawaiian company was nearly ruined a few years ago by the competition of the Southern Pacific owned Pacific Mail steamship line. A railroad owned steamship line can afford to lose money on freight if the railroad will be able to collect high local freight rates and use them to pay losses of their steamers.

**Farmers Will Pay Taxes Direct.**

Every farmer in the county whose total values from wheat raising, dairying, hogs, cattle, sheep, horses, and chickens when added together totals more than \$3000 per annum if single, or \$4000 per annum if married, will now pay a share of running the government of this country direct to federal tax collectors; the same as is done in Germany, Russia, and other European countries.

Under the income tax feature of the tariff bill Oregon will contribute a quarter of a million dollars annually to the revenues of the United States. This is the estimate of collector of internal revenue M. A. Miller who will be responsible for the collection of tax in this state.

The law prescribes that the tax shall be collected, so far as is possible, "at the source." This means that the collection of the tax is to be made before rents are paid to land holders and perhaps it will work into an increase of rent for land in Sherman county as very few farms but raise a total of more than the amount specified if rentals and expense be not deducted. Under the workings of the new tariff law no deductions are allowed, as the gross and not net income, is the one the government will use for tax collection purposes.

The soft fruit season is just about ended, but Postmaster General Burleson is still endeavoring to find a few democratic plums hanging to the tree that the faithful may have overlooked.

There seems to be no hurry on the part of either the men or women voters of the county and Moro to register for the special election that will be held next month. Registration books will soon close. Those who register this month, under the new law, need not again register unless they change their politics or residence.

A movement that is interesting the more prominent educators of the state is the assembling of a larger state school fund; that more proficient teachers be employed by raising the standard necessary to enable them to teach, and that the compulsory school term for all districts be increased from six months to eight or nine. A meeting furthering these objects was held in Salem last week and another will be held at the same place in December.

Oregon made a large commercial advance October 1st, 1913, when the steamer Weown in charge of Captain Fred Sherman successfully made the trip from White Salmon to Portland towing a log raft, going through the Cascades canal and the lower cascade rapids. The trip from Portland back to Portland consumed but 29 hours, taking the raft of 350,000 feet through the canal in three sections, joining them into one raft at Bonneville.

Polk county superintendent of schools has added, with the help of the O.A.C. department, a dairy course to school work in that county. The aim of the work is twofold, to place in the school something to be done that to the pupil has a real motive for doing and to some degree learn the greatness of their county as a dairy belt.

The annual Sherman County Fair is going to be another successful endeavor towards showing to best advantage the latent resources of our county. The rains have come at about the right time to make our visitors in the county thoroughly enjoy every minute of their stay and also enables those fortunate to have them as visitors enjoy the various trips over our roads which with few exceptions are now at their best for pleasure riding.


