Dietrich who comes to Moro from Chico, California. Mr. Dietrich formerly lived in Wasco county, where his father for several years practiced medicine at Dufur and The Dalles.

Included in the exhibit at the poultry house of the Sherman county fair this week is a fine exhibit of five month old Ancona pullets and cockerel by A. Rose. This is a new breed being introduced into the county and which rank high as egg producers, some authorities going so far as to say that they average better than the leghorn chicken.

Mrs. V. M. Hennagin, who is visiting with her children in the county from her home near Corvallis expects to spend the winter at McMinville with her mother, an old lady of ninety who is yet more active than some who are younger in years.

The residence portion of Moro was without electric lights a part of last week; caused by the installing of a new cylinder on one of the 25-horse power gas engines in the lighting plant. It needed careful handling for a day or two to keep it from over heating and becoming damaged.

T. J. Henkle, who recently purchased the W. C. Rees farming interest, was in town Friday after wood. He said he choose a windy dusty day so the quicker to become initiated to some of the disagreeable features of this county and the better to enjoy afterwards the nicer days to come.

Sherman county got up bright and early Friday morning and dusted to the county fair at Tygh Valley. There were twelve automobiles from this vicinity as visitors there for their last days fair, each car being loaded to capacity. The Tygh fair managers said that Sherman county, in number of visitors, did better by them than their own county.

The annual institute of teachers of Sherman and Wasco counties was held this week at The Dalles, beginning early Monday morning and continuing until Wednesday noon. All teachers who were present at the opening of the institute and continue until the close are entitled to their per diem from the school districts over which they have charge, the same as if their school had not been interrupted.

Miss Alma Kruger, sister to Mrs. L. J. Pape, left for her home at Sherwood Friday accompanied by little Mildred Pape who will attend school at that place. Mildred is seven years old but, unfortunately, when very young had an accident happen that affected her spine and she has not been able to walk since. Within a short time the concrete grain elevators being built by the Globe Grain and Milling company at Portland near the O. W. R. & N. Co. bridge will be finished. Work is now being done on the wooden dock bins which are designed to first hold the wheat from the cars and before it goes to the cleaners and in to the concrete storage tanks by means of belt conveyors. The steamer Portland, owned by the company, is at Long Beach, Cal., having tanks installed for carrying grain in bulk, and her overhauling will cost \$40,000. She will be in operation as soon as the elevator is ready, and little time will be lost in handling this seasons crop.

Primary Election will be next May.

Considerable confusion exists in the minds of many persons as to the date of the primary election in 1914. It is not generally known that the last legislature passed a law fixing the date of the primary immediately preceding the regular biennial election as the third Friday in May of 1914, and biennially thereafter, there being no change in the time for holding such election in presidential years. The purpose of this change, as explained to the legislators is to allow for an extra month every other year, prior to the primary election from the opening of the registration books, January 1, and at the same time to permit political parties, subject to the primary law, to select their delegates in ample time for attendance upon their national conventions for the selection of presidential candidates.
