Successful County Fair

Last Saturday afternoon when the exhibits for the fifth annual Sherman county fair was released, the ticket seller and gate keepers deserted their posts and the entrance gates were thrown open to all, then the curtain was rung down upon the most successful and entertaining fair so far held in Sherman county.

The exhibits in the pavilion were not as many nor as varied as in former years but what was on exhibition were in the main first quality products; in the new stable built this year for the exhibits of cattle and swine were some of the finest animals to be seen at any fair anywhere.

The weather during the week was a trifle cool and the days were full of rainy spots with the exception of the last day, devoted to the School Childrens Industrial Fair and Wasco Day. That was the best weather day of the fair, being sunny and warm.

The fair directors should be commended for the excellence of the entertainment program; one event followed another with precision and dispatch; there were no monotonous waiting. The fancy trick riding and wild west features were exceptionally good; while the chariot racing occupied the interested attention of all present.

We have not the space nor the time to go over the books of the fair association and separate the winning entrants in each class, but in our visits to the fair it came to our attention that F. E. Brown of Rufus was winner of several prizes in his division. He received blue ribbons on squash, tomatoes, string beans, peaches, and grapes; also red ribbons on grapes pears, cucumbers; and Mrs. Brown received a red ribbon on rye bread.

J. T. Boothby of the Fleck Orchards, was another from Rufus that walked off with considerable prize winners. He received blue ribbons on squash, grape, walnuts, pumpkins, two blues on peaches, and three on pears; he also received red ribbons on grapes and pumpkins and a blue ribbon for the best general exhibit.

W. A. Woods was another of our acquaintance that received a list of prizes; he received a blue ribbon on Poland China goat, Lincoln Buck, Angora goat; and red ribbons on English Berkshire brood sow and also another on English Berkshire litter of pigs and still another on saddle horse.

W. S. Powell won the Novelty saddle race both days, the last day cutting down his time by his mount going through the fence. The only accident to mar the festivities was a riderless horse running down and bruising A. M. Tillson of Grass Valley, with no serious injuries to Mr. Tillson.

The prize boar offered by the O W R & N Co. for the best litter of pigs and sow was won by A. H. Barnum. The general consensus of opinion seems to be that A. H. has a white elephant.

The prevalent idea seems to be that the animal is a fine, healthy, robust, specimen of a cultus cul picked up some where and palmed off on the company. Either the company got nothing for their money or else Sherman county swine raisers are very deficient in what constitutes the good points of such an animal.

Fans in the Eighteenth Century.

One Voice Must.
Composers have not scorned writing airs to suit the style of particular singers, thus, as Francis Rogers remarks, "storing up for the usual voices of subsequent generations much travail and sorrow." Mendelssohn crowded "Hear Ye, Israel," with high F sharps to give Jenny Lind, whom he adored, a chance to display the particular beauty of her voice in that region, with the result that that air has been a sore trial to most sopranos ever since. Faure, the famous French baritone, also had a particularly facile and melow high F sharp, and many parts were written especially to give him a chance to exhibit it to the gasping multitude. But in most baritone voices this F sharp is the very limit of the upper range, and although it may have both power and brilliancy or facility; consequently all the roles written for Faure (Meyerbeer's "Dinorah," for instance) are particularly trying for the ordinary baritone.—Argonaut.

Wearing Shabby Clothes.
It's a great thing to wear shabby clothes and an old hat. Some of the best things I have ever known, like these experiences of the streets, have resulted from coming up to life from underneath, of being taken for less than I am rather than for more than I am.
