Possibly after a while Oregon will receive benefits from the legislature putting commission men under regulation of the railway commission. That body has been restrained by the courts under initiative of parties affected but technicalities will soon be brushed aside. When reviewing the efforts of commission men to evade the law one is the more convinced of its need; while on the other hand it is a compliment to the personnel and the integrity of the railroad commission to be burdened with its enforcement the publisher of this paper is of the opinion very few realize the work placed upon them.

Governor West is busy ascertaining the need of an extra session of the legislature to provide funds necessary to maintain the state institutions without creating a deficiency. It is an odd circumstance that the governor could not have waited to secure aid from the legislature direct instead of using the emergency board as a means of securing a refund of that \$1500 spent by him over the amount appropriated by the state for law enforcement. The new eight hour law is the crimp that twists the pledge of the governor that no institution shall be allowed to exceed its appropriation during his term.

Oregonians who have lately returned from Europe report there will be a rush of immigrants to the Pacific coast as soon as the Panama canal is open to general traffic. The steamship companies are selling tickets on the installment plan, accepting small weekly payments and allowing interest on such deposits. The prospective immigrants are mostly of the farming class and they are not particular as to just where they land. Anywhere the steamer happens to stop will suit them. They evidently figure that while some places on the coast may be better than others, any place is good enough.

Preliminary plans have been made and another conference will be held at Albany on October 30, in the movement to combine the eight Willamette Valley counties in the preparation and installation of a great valley exhibit at the Panama-Pacific Exposition at San Francisco in 1915. It has been decided that this is a better plan than to attempt to put in an exhibit from each county. The proposition has met with general approval and its success is already assured.

So many of the industries of Oregon are directly related to the development of mineral or water resources that the work of the United States geological survey is always of special importance in this state. Oregon, in common with other public land states, is now receiving a much larger share of attention from the federal survey than the older states of the east, largely because of the need of information for the classification of the public lands.

So many hunters are killed by mistake in Maine that the license has been raised from \$15 to \$25. The pastime still seems reasonably inexpensive.

How to Vote on State University

On the contrary if you desire to destroy it vote NO. In other words vote 300.—X—Yes and 302.—X—Yes, and you will be doing a splendid work for higher education in Oregon.

Co-operation Store in Klickitat County

Klickitat farmers have started a co-operative general merchandise store at Bickelton, with a cash capital of \$10,000 and an experienced man employed to manage the business.

The plan is to sell all goods for cash at regular retail prices. At the end of the year, after all expenses and eight per cent on the money invested, have been paid any remaining profits will be distributed pro rata among the farmers according to the amount of merchandise each one has purchased during the year.

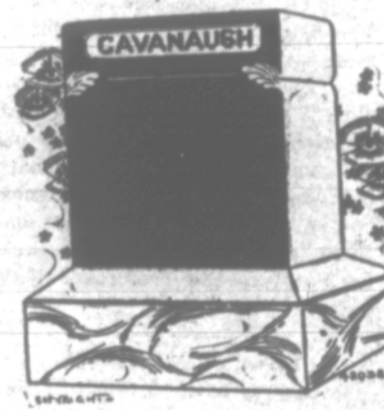
