why your county and towns were not re-

month.

I do not venture to say that you would
take it upon your-self to publish this
statement in your worthy columns without
some authority, but whatever authority
you may have I do want to say at this
time, is false, and without foundation,

town during this year.

If there is such a letter in your town as
was claimed, bearing my supposed sig-
nature, it has been forged and I ask you
to secure the same, and in case you cannot
then ask you to make this statement clear
to the public.

Pheasants to Be Liberated

Three thousand China Pheas-
ants will be liberated in Oregon
counties this year as a part of the
programme of the state game war-
den to stock this section with
game birds. Practically half of
these will be sent into eastern
Oregon. There are some 1500
pheasants and 3000 eggs for hatch-
ing still at the farm, and the eggs
are being added to at the rate of
100 a day.
