More than 150 tons of Australian and New Zealand butter has been placed upon the markets of Seattle and Portland this month; with larger shipments received at San Francisco. These shipments of butter are expected to continue through the winter months; caused in part by the reduction of duty under the new tariff bill and also by reason of the seasons being reversed and those months being the ones that dairying is most profitable in the southern hemisphere. Dealers admit that it will be hard competition of the home article as it can be more cheaply produced and pay the freight and then leave a good margin for handling foreign butter.

### Circuit Court Proceedings.

The regular November term of circuit court convened last Monday, with Judge D. R. Parker presiding.

The following were drawn as a grand jury, to hold until the regular May term of court, P. H. Zobel, foreman, I. A. Coffey, T. W. Alley, V. B. Eakin, O. C. Hogue, R. W. Belshec, J. L. Brackett.

In the case of the state vs Conley Harbin; indicted last May for assault with dangerous weapon and at that time entered plea of not guilty; at this time plea changed to guilty to assault and battery; fined \$50.

Wasco Warehouse Milling company vs A. T. Striker; settled and dismissed.

J. H. Wilson vs E. H. Stone and W. H. Moore; settled and dismissed.

N. H. Alexander vs Fred Hennagin; demurrer submitted without argument.

In the case of the state vs Willis Lawrence; indicted for horse stealing; tried before the following jury: J. C. Hockman, G. C. Friedley, Chris Anderson, Geo. Hennagin, Chas. Bullard, Asa Eslinger, C. F. Guyton, Otto Bucholtz, I. E. Fields, R. B. Hailey, H. H. Duckworth, M. L. Evans. This case was the longest trial of such an indictment for the last several years. Verdict of guilty. Crime carries a sentence of from one to ten years. Attorney C. J. Bright, for the defense, indicated a new trial might be asked, but it is not probable, that he will ask it. District Attorney Huddleston was assisted in the case by Judge R. R. Butler of The Dalles.

In the case of the state vs A. P. Estabrook; indicted for assault upon R. D. Jackson with intent to kill; tried before the following jury: W. E. Dutton, W. K. Haggerty, H. H. Duckworth, R. C. Bennet, W. H. Andrews, C. F. Guyton, Fred Blau, Otto Bucholtz, Asa Eslinger, G. C. Friedley, E. A. Hoskinson, R. B. Hailey. Two jurors were excused for cause, one by the state and four by the defense. E. B. Dufur of Portland is chief counsel for the defense, assisted by W. C. Bryant of Moro; District Attorney Huddleston, has charge of the prosecution, assisted by Judge R. R. Butler of The Dalles. After Attorney Huddleston had made the opening argument for the state the attorneys for the defense waived further argument and the case went to the jury at four o'clock Thursday.

There are three civil suits to be tried out at this term, following disposal of the criminal cases, and court does not expect to adjourn until late Saturday.
