The First Newspaper Woman

Mrs. Annie Royall was the first woman journalist and the first of her sex to own and edit a newspaper. Born in Maryland in 1769, she was the widow of a Virginia revolutionary officer when in 1824 she first appeared in Washington to obtain a pension.

Failing in this, she managed to obtain an old printing press and some battered long primer type, with which, aided by a tramp compositor, she published on Capitol Hill a weekly called The Washington Paul Pry.

Every person of distinction who visited Washington received a call from Mrs. Royall. If they subscribed to her sheet they were described in the next number in a complimentary manner; otherwise she black-guarded them.

She survived to witness the political rise of Abraham Lincoln, dying in 1864. She met and talked with every man who became president of the United States from Washington to Lincoln. She was a terror to politicians and especially of congressmen, but at last she became so unendurable that she was indicted as a common scold and by Judge Cranch in circuit court was sentenced to be "ducked," according to the English law, which still survived in the District of Columbia, though it had been allowed to slumber in adolescence.

Mrs. Royall escaped the distinction of being the last woman ever "ducked," her sentence being committed to fine and imprisonment.

The East and the West

Every man who has lived in the two sections is aware of the great difference that exists between life in the east and life in the west. There is a freedom and breeziness and a likeness about folks out here that is in sharp contrast to the actions of those down in the older states.

The reason is not far to seek. We have no great cities with their slums close by palaces; we have vastly fewer millionaires and also a smaller proportion of the desperately poor. We live largely by agriculture and commerce, and we have no immense factories with their contrasting big houses on the hill and shacks in the valley.

Poor houses are not numerous and where they are found the number of their inmates is small. Wealth is more evenly distributed and this makes for content. There is also lacking the feeling of caste that is marked in the older centers of population. There are indications, however, of our losing some of these most excellent advantages, although so long as agriculture is so great a factor in our prosperity this will never reach the limits that are evident in the east.

This changing condition is one that nothing can halt, since it is the inevitable accompaniment of growing riches, to properly distribute which mankind has not yet evolved a workable system.

Boys and Men

You are boys now, but you will soon be men. You are half as tall as you will ever be. Soon you will have your own way to make in the world. Do you mean to be idle and fretful and deceive people and give them a bad opinion of you? Or do you intend to go to work, and act bravely and nobly, and do your duty, and leave a name behind you when you die which the world will love and respect?

Take care—now is the time! Did you ever notice a large tree that grew crooked, and was an ugly eyesore on that account? Perhaps it stood on the lawn, right in front of the porch, and your father would have liked very much to straighten it. It was impossible to do so. A hundred horses could not have dragged it erect, and yet, think of the time when the large tree, was a small one, a sapling, a child might have straightened it then, and would have grown properly and everyone would have admired it.

Boys ought to grow straight, not crooked. You are young now, as the tree was once. Begin in time and you will be as straight as an arrow when you are a man. If you wait it will be too late. The way to make men erect and noble is to take them when they are boys, and to show them that there is nothing in the world so noble as doing their duty.

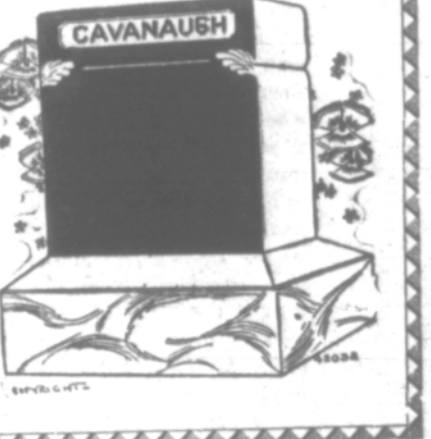
