Substantial Farm Improvements

The Moro Hardware and Implement Co. last week sold to Jas. Woods for his farm north of Demoss a Samson wind mill and 3500 feet of galvanized pipe. The mill is a twelve foot Samson which has replaced a mill of another make, using the same thirty foot tower. The pipe was laid a distance of three quarters of a mile from the well and up a hill and grade of four hundred feet while the well has a depth of 225 feet, making a lift of 225 feet and rise of 400 feet and conveying it the three quarters of a mile, through pipe starting at one and a quarter inch for 2000 feet and inch pipe for 1500 feet.

The system is now in operation and reports are that it needs but very slight wind to set the mill to work and water to be delivered at the farm buildings on the hill. This new system of water supply eliminates water haulage; the well has been in commission for a number of years, but this is the first mill that has been able to deliver the water from the well, up the hill, to where it was needed.

Meatly Mutton sheep

The bureau of animal industry of the United States department of agriculture has called attention recently to the extensive occurrence of sheep measles, due to a species of tapeworm derived from sheep dogs.

More than 17,000 of the sheep slaughtered under federal supervision during the year 1913 prior to December 1 were found to be affected with "measles," and we are assured that as the methods of meat inspection become more efficient the number of cases detected will be relatively more numerous.

Theoretically, there is no objection from a hygienic standpoint according to government information, to passing affected mutton for food after the parasites have been removed. No great harm can be done if a few parasites hidden in the muscles have escaped observation; therefore, the stringent regulations pertaining to infested beef or pork need not apply to mutton. The esthetic sense of consumers, however, as well as the current temperament in regard to such matters, tends towards the insistence on rigid enforcement of strict inspection and condemnation provisions. The logical way, therefore, to avoid large monetary losses thereby involved will be to institute more rigid methods of prevention, beginning with dogs on the sheep ranches.
