Citizens Mass Meeting

Pursuant to call a mass meeting of the citizens of Moro was held at the court house Wednesday evening to nominate three councilmen for the ensuing terms. Nominations were not very plentiful and after a degree of diffidence Messrs. W. H. Ragsdale, H. U. Martin, and W. C. Rutledge were nominated to succeed themselves. For city treasurer P. H. Buxton was nominated to succeed himself.

An explanation was made by Councilman Barnum regarding the proposed refunding bond issue; he wanted it clearly understood that it did not increase the city indebtedness in any way, but provided a way of paying the present bonded indebtedness in semi yearly payments as the city may desire in amounts not less than \$500. He also said that practically all warrants were now redeemed and the city was operating on a cash basis.

The fifth annual convention of the Columbia and Snake river waterways association will be held in Portland April 13-14, in the parlors of the Portland commercial club.

Through a correspondent in Portland we are advised of the death of Rose Stanley, formerly a resident of this city when her father was cashier of the W. W. M. Co. bank.

Dates for the international livestock exposition have been fixed for December 7-12, 1914 at the union stockyards in Portland. The announcement is made thus early in the season in order that stockmen and ranchers may have a long season in which to prepare their exhibits.

The street committee of the city council are to be congratulated upon the neat way the improvement of Main street is being conducted. When finished the work will be a matter of pleased commendation in place of the general air of apology formerly of common use towards the stranger within our gates.

Sheriff J. C. McKean is making an enviable record as tax collector for this county. So for this year he has collected a total of \$165,000 from the current tax roll and has cut the delinquent roll of 1910 to \$171.56; that of 1911 to \$192.98, and that of 1912 to \$112.93. This is the best record for collections of delinquent tax rolls of any other county in the state.

Moro has decided upon Sunday, April 19th, as "going to church day." This is conforming to a nation wide movement for the residents of each locality to all attend church at least one day that month, both services if possible but one in any event. Each one attending church that day is to follow personal inclinations, but see that some one church has a chance to welcome their attending.

M. D. Shanks of Condon, was a visitor this week in the county in the interests of his candidacy in the republican primaries for the nomination for Circuit Judge. While here he renewed several acquaintances, among others that of G. E. Lewellen of the Moro Commercial Co., who was a classmate of Mr. Shanks at Willamette University. Mr. Shanks has been a resident of this judicial district for several years; two years being deputy district attorney for Wheeler county, before his removing to Condon. Mr. Shanks is a young man, but thirty two years of age, and a graduate of Willamette University in the Liberal Arts and Law departments.
