At the close of business December 31, 1913, life insurance companies had insurance in force in Oregon aggregating \$116,539,942.76 according to the annual statement of insurance commissioner Ferguson.

A commercial traveler from Portland, using a Ford auto, went off a bridge Wednesday morning just north of the J. C. Hockman farm; the machine was badly wrecked, being taken to Wasco for repairs.

NEW CANAL NEARLY CUT.

Small Craft Will Be Allowed to Pass Through Cape Cod Ditch Shortly. Sandwich, Mass.—The Cape Cod canal is likely to be open for small craft within six months. This six mile ditch connecting Cape Cod bay with Buzzards bay is 75 per cent completed, according to the engineers, and it is believed that the waters of the two bays will meet the coming summer.

When first opened the canal will not be sufficiently deep to admit coastwise vessels, but power boats and other small craft will be allowed to go through. Already several New England yacht clubs are planning cruises with the canal passage in view.

Two big dredges that entered the canal, one at each end, are now within 8,000 feet of each other at Bourne. Between them, for nearly a mile, is a fifteen foot trench which will be flooded when the dredges cut the barriers.

Young People Have Serious Accident

George Meloy jr. and Ben Tomlin met with a severe mishap last Tuesday evening about eight o'clock while coasting down First street upon a bicycle built for one. They had been coasting down the hill for several trips, one using the saddle as a seat and the other standing between the saddle and handle bars on the pedals, but this time they met an automobile at the intersection of Main and First streets, driven by T. C. Lee, which was going slow and preparing to stop to allow Mrs. Lee to leave the car.

Evidently the boys saw the auto and danger of collision and George Meloy, driving, tried to turn and go by, but they were traveling at an estimated speed of forty miles an hour, without use of brakes or pedal, and could not avoid the impact with the auto; hitting it a glancing blow that threw both boys onto the ground with considerable force and under the auto, parts of their clothing being found after the accident attached to the under side of the machine.

George Meloy was the most severely hurt of the two, his jaw was broken and scalp torn where the rear wheel of the auto passed over his head and he has a bad cut on his chin that required five stitches. It will probably be some days before the extent of injuries received by George Meloy can be ascertained as he was not fully conscious Thursday morning, when he was taken by train in care of Dr. Poley and his mother to a hospital in Portland. Ben Tomlin had recovered from the shock and was able to be out of bed the next day.

City Election Quiet affair

Election day in Moro last Monday passed off as only an incidental part of city life in the capital of Sherman county. There were five candidates to select from to fill the terms of three councilmen for the ensuing two years; three H. U. Martin, W. H. Ragsdale, and W. C. Rutledge being candidates of one caucus of citizens and J. M. Axtell and O. B. Messenger being candidates selected by an opposing caucus of voters; all names being printed upon the official ballot.

There were 107 votes cast, three voters being sworn in; W. H. Ragsdale received 95, H. U. Martin 84, W. C. Rutledge 58, J. M. Axtell 44, O. B. Messenger 29, for councilman and P. H. Buxton 85 for city treasurer with no opposition.

A measure proposed by the city council to authorize the issuance of \$10,000 of refunding bonds with which to pay off the present bonded indebtedness and which will contain a provision by which installment payments can be made on the principal, carried by a majority of 82 votes; only two voted against the measure and most likely they did not understand that unless this was voted favorably the courts may have forced the city at any tax paying time to levy a tax that would have raised the entire sum at one tax paying; this might have raised some property holders completely out of Moro, if it were not paid. A bond is a mortgage, in this case on each individual piece of property in Moro for the entire amount, and if ordered by foreclosure suit to be paid it would have had to be done.
