Among visitors of note attending the Presbytery last week was Rev. J. M. Morrison. Mr. Morrison is an old pioneer of this county and was the first pastor of Moro Presbyterian church; when started as a branch of the church at Monkland.

Base ball is now on as one of the regular entertaining sports of this section; the best game for quite a spell was the opening game at Grass Valley last Sunday between that town and Moro. The score, after thirteen innings, stood six to seven; with Grass Valley holding the seventh.

Clean up day in Moro was generally observed by all sorts of rubbish being removed from back yards and the citizens turning out in force to do volunteer work on the streets of the city. When evening came First street was as pretty a street as could be found in several days drive from Moro.

The farmers of Sherman county are receiving shipments of calves by express from a sort of calf clearing house in Tillamook county at the rate of five dollars a head and all charges paid. A new law prevents the killing of dairy calves and Sherman county is rapidly securing some fine future dairy stock for very little money.

J. N. Landry is having the exterior of his Moro tinsorial parlors painted in white to conform with the interior white paint and enamel finish of his establishment. The barber pole suspended in front of the establishment has received a varnishing to be in keeping with the rest of the cleaning in vogue throughout the town this week.

W. H. Ragdale with his auto and party, and L. Barnum with his auto and party, including W. C. Bryant, were representatives from Moro at the Good Roads meeting on McDonald grade last Thursday. They report that the road is now in good condition, plenty of pick and shovel work as well as powder was used by all participating.

Farmers Union Meeting

At the last regular meeting of the local farmers union Saturday afternoon it was voted that two cars of eighteen inch cedar posts be purchased for the members who had turned in their orders for a varying number needed by each.

It was also voted to purchase two hundred cords of sixteen inch pine wood at prices quoted and a purchasing agent was appointed by the union to inspect the wood and if satisfactory to make a payment to hold it and balance to be paid on delivery at Moro; the necessary expense to be borne by the union.

A committee was appointed consisting of F. R. Messenger, as chairman, W. S. Powell and C. L. Ireland to confer with a like committee from the Grass Valley and Wasco unions to arrange for a basket dinner and picnic to be held at Demos or some other convenient place in the county about the first of June at which time measures to be voted on at the coming election will be discussed as affecting the farmers; particularly the eight hour law that will compel a farmer to have a double shift of men at harvest time if he wants to do a days threshing.

The next regular meeting will be April 25th.

Ninety Sixth Anniversary

Two Measures With Merit

Attorney General A. M. Crawford, who is a candidate for the republican nomination for governor, has drawn up two amendments to the constitution which he will file with the secretary of state for submission to the voters at the coming election.

One is an amendment giving the governor the right to veto single items in appropriation bills. The other amendment is one regarding the initiative and referendum.

The principal change from the existing law is that it gives one or more voters the power to propose a measure for the vote of the people by filing a copy of it with the secretary of state together with a filing fee of \$200, the plan being for this filing fee to be applied on the cost of printing and mailing election pamphlets.

The attorney general is of the opinion that this latter provision will do away with the paid petition circulators, the money going to the state instead of to these men.

Presbytery Meets at Moro

The annual spring meeting of the Pendleton Presbytery met at Moro, in the Presbyterian church, last week beginning Thursday evening and continuing until Sunday evening. Business sessions were held twice each day with a popular meeting in the evening presided over by some one of the visiting ministers on each occasion.

Rev. W. L. Van Nuy, the retiring moderator, presided the first evening and preached the sermon. Reports from the different churches of the Presbytery showed fair progress during the past year; some changes were made in different pastorates, leaving some vacant, which new ministers, coming into the Presbytery, will supply.

Rev. J. M. Cornelison, missionary to the Indians at Umatilla reservation near Pendleton, and the attending Indian elder, Robinson Minthorn, were elected delegates to represent the Presbytery at the Presbyterian General Assembly at Chicago May 21 to 30.

The popular meetings each evening were well attended and the Easter services of Sunday were enjoyed by capacity houses both morning and evening; the church being beautifully decorated with potted plants and lilies for the occasion. The Sunday morning sermon was preached by the newly elected moderator, Rev. J. E. Faucett of Stanfield, and the evening sermon Rev. E. W. Warrington of Freewater. Robinson Minthorn, the Indian elder in attendance, gave a short address to the congregation at the Sunday evening service; his remarks being interpreted by Rev. Cornelison, missionary to the Indians; they also sang two duets in the Indian tongue which was recognized by the congregation as the gospel songs "Showers of Blessing" and "Down at the Cross."

Resolutions were adopted at the Sunday evening service calling attention that the year closed without loss of membership through death; thanking the committee of arrangements and the people of Moro for favors received and hospitality shown; and giving thanks to Almighty God "for the ties of brotherhood which bind us all together as one family and co-laborers for one common purpose."
