POLITICAL GOSSIP

Dr. J. W. Donnelly of Condon, candidate at the primary election for the Republican nomination for state representative from this district, was a visitor in the county this week. Friday spending the day with the Good Roads delegation from Moro and vicinity in having good permanent thoroughfares for travel.

Dr. Donnelly is highly pleased with the reception his candidacy has been received in this county and in that regard is very favorably placed as to fitness and ability to represent this district as he is now a resident of Gilliam county and for a long term of years was also a resident of Wheeler county, those two with Sherman forming the representative district.

MORO TAKES SECOND GAME OF SERIES FROM GRASS VALLEY

In the second game of the season the Moro Ball Team took a fall out of the Grass Valley bunch on the Moro diamond Sunday April 19th. Smith's pitching. Earl Old's home run with one on, in the second inning and Rutledge's three bagger with the bases full in the last half of the second were easily the features of the game. Neither side scored in the first inning but in the first of the second Grass Valley got a man on first and he reached second on a passed ball. Earl Old's, the next batter, picked out a good one and poled a long fly to deep center field which went for a home run owing to the fact that the center fielder had come in to take a throw at second base. No more runs were made by Grass Valley during Smith's term on the mound.

In the beginning of the 7th inning with the game safely stowed away, Rutledge took the box for Moro and Smith went to center field. Rutledge pitched the 7th and Benson finished out the 8th and 9th innings. Two runs each were made off of Rutledge and Benson making the visitors total 6 for the game. Grass Valley took the lead in the second inning when she scored two runs. Moro came right back and by heavy stick work scored five runs in the last half of the second. The third inning was a repetition of the second for Moro when the heavy cannonading kept right on and produced five more runs. This inning saw the last of Jim Lium as pitcher for Grass Valley. Earl Olds went in the box in the beginning of the 4th and pitched good ball during the remainder of the game.

Curing Warbles in Cattle

Grubs of the ox warble may be removed from the backs of cattle by lifting them out with a small, short jawed forceps. This small instrument can be bought for fifty cents, and its use involves but little pain. Removing the grub causes great relief to the tortured animals, which are damaged as well as distressed by the larvae.

All larvae removed should be killed to prevent their development into flies. According to Professor Wilson, entomologist of the Oregon Agricultural College, the larvae are hatched from eggs laid the summer previous by a fly that resembles a honey bee. Eggs are laid on the animal's hair, licked off and swallowed by the animal, and hatch in the paunch or gullet. From there, some of the small worms work their way through the body of the animal to the skin, which they puncture. At this time they grow rapidly, causing the itching lumps on the backs of cattle.

Small incisions may be made with a sharp knife soon after the lump appears, and the grub removed with the forceps. If this is done quickly cattle do not resist much.
