GOOD ROADS DAY

Sherman County Workers in Evidence at Widely Separate Points

There will be spent this year in Oregon approximately \$4,000,000 in the construction of new roads and bridges and in the repair and maintenance of existing roads and the answer to the query as to how to expend this money to the most advantage is the problem that must be solved by each local community affected, when it is considered that the construction of county roads is the most important problem in Oregon today.

Friday, the 24th, was chosen in Sherman county as Good Roads Day in observance of the state wide movement to donate one day of that week universally over the state in an effort to improve and better the arteries of commerce radiating through each community and thus make easier and better the intercommunication of neighbor with neighbor and also, incidentally provide an improved highway for visitors passing from one part of the state to another.

Those from Moro and vicinity choose the road and grade lying between this city and Monkland and on to the county line at the John Day river where the county court last year had built, in cooperation with the officials of Gilliam county, a steel bridge crossing that river.

That meant a stretch of improved road when night came of over fifteen miles; the day was spent in widening the road in places; eliminating bad grades, and the removing of considerable rock bedded in the roadway. In one place near Monkland rock were taken from the road that weighed possibly half a ton each; some by means of pick and crowbar and others by blasting.

At noon time the workers in and near Monkland and Moro gathered at the Hardin farm where the ladies of the party had spread an appetizing lunch, more appropriately called dinner, on long extension tables under the spreading trees of the grove and close to the running stream of water that makes the Hardin place so famous for its green vegetables in season. Like all dinners so served in Sherman county there was plenty for all and a good deal to spare when the last hungry man had been regaled to his satisfaction.

After dinner it was more work and the general sentiment that prevailed was voiced by Attorney Bryant who would not lay down his shovel to start for home until "lets leave this piece of road in a condition not to be ashamed of" had been thoroughly attended to by those present.

When this road has been extended and improved by Gilliam county, as it will be this year, it will put Moro and Condon on the cross-state highway from Walla Walla, Pendleton, and Heppner and shorten the distance between those points and The Dalles by forty miles is the claim of Gilliam county residents who are in a position to know. As well as providing an easier road for travel going across the state.

Candidate for Justice Supreme Court

Charles L. McNary, now a member of the Supreme Court of the state, and candidate for nomination to one of the four nominations to be made by republican voters at the primary election is a resident of Salem, having been born on a farm near that city, and is forty years old. After obtaining his early education in the Salem public schools he earned his way thru college, and entered upon the practice of his profession with his brother in Salem more than fifteen years ago, the two succeeded in establishing a large legal practice.

He served for a number of years as assistant district attorney for the third judicial district, comprising the counties of Marion, Linn, Polk, Yonhill and Tillamook, and also as dean of the Willamette College of Law. This latter position he continued to hold until in recognition of his legal attainments he was made a justice of the supreme court.

During the time he has served as a member of this court he has rendered a number of decisions which have attracted state wide attention. One of the most important and far reaching written by him was in the case of McMahan vs Olcott, wherein Justice McNary upheld the action of the last legislature. In that opinion, which decided many disputed points, Justice McNary among other things said that "whether a policy began by the state in any given legislative or initiative enactment is laden with sound judge-

ment designed to promote the welfare of the people or is fraught with dangerous consequences, is a legislative or political question and not within the review of the courts, so long as it is not in contravention of the constitution or subversive of natural justice and common right."

Such a decision as the above helps wonderfully to clarify the political atmosphere of "intentions" of new laws that are simply held up by those who wish court rulings that they may continue along the lines of former business practice which the new law would prohibit. The "intention" is generally there; but a "legal" opinion is necessary and court procedure required that consumes time so that the law does not get to work when desired by those who have public welfare most at heart.

Justice McNary is owner of one of the finest farms in the Willamette valley, and has always been deeply interested and closely identified with the agricultural development of the state. He is now, and has been for a number of years president of the Salem fruit union, an organization which has been a powerful factor in attracting the attention of the country to Oregon fruit, and he believes that the time is not far distant when this state will lead in the production of fruit and agricultural products.
