Sherman County Irrigation Project.

During the first three months of this year John H. Lewis, state engineer, issued 154 permits for the appropriation of water, including eight permits to construct reservoirs. Under these permits it is proposed to irrigate 28,994 acres of land, develop 21,968 horsepower at an estimated cost of \$2,500,000.

The following permits have been issued in Sherman county during that period. R. Morehouse of Klondike, for the irrigation of ten acres, diverting water from the John Day river in section 28 twp 2 n r 19 e; Mattie J. McDonald of McDonald, for the irrigation of 196 acres with the waters of Rock creek diverted in section 12 twp 1 n r 19 e.

The Cup America Defender.

Shamrock IV, Sir Thomas Lipton's new challenger for the America's cup, described by those who have seen her as the most wonderful boat of her kind ever built, is to be launched May 25. Her trial races will begin the first week in June. The new challenger is said to be entirely original in design and to combine many novel features.

The American boat, built to defend the cup, is named the Resolute and is in the water and made her first trial last week. The Lipton boat, under the terms of the race, must cross the Atlantic under her own sails.

Has been an intimate and convenient understudy of the Progressive National Committeeman and seems now to be in combination with him in an attempt to shanghai the Republican organization. It is an abuse against which fair-minded men of all parties will rise in protest. We can never have a reunited party by pushing to the front political botheads and men who are political reformers simply for the sake of office. Having been a Republican only twenty-four hours when he announced his candidacy for the highest honorary position in the gift of the party, is some indication of what Mr. Ackerson's motive was in registering as a Republican. As Hon. Ralph E. Williams is the only Republican who is a candidate for Republican National Committeeman, we feel warranted in urging all loyal Republicans in the state to give him their earnest and enthusiastic support.
