During the year 1913 the state collected a total of \$56,889.48 for automobile and chauffeur license at a total cost of \$13,396.92, leaving a net balance on hand of \$43,492.56 to be returned to the different counties to go into their road funds. Of this amount Sherman county received \$404.04 from a gross collection of \$528.50. The expenses charged include furnishing the number plates, postage, expressage, printing, clerk hire, etc.

While in Pendleton last month A. D. Richeldorfer was a guest for a short time at the home of J. R. Thompson; Mr. Thompson operates a 75 horsepower Holt caterpillar and between March 8th and April 20th had plowed 1960 acres of land eleven inches deep, using two men to a shift of twelve hours each and changing at noon. The Newest Large Vessel

The Imperator will yield its proud position as queen of the seas next month, when its sister ship, the Vaterland reaches New York city. This floating palace is 950 feet long, 100 feet in width, and as in the case of the Imperator her hull has been constructed with a complete inner skin carried high above the water-line, making her a ship within a ship. The owners of this boat say that she is proof against collision or similar accidents. In this modern palace there has been recruited a complete fire department picked from German cities, and there are more than a sufficient number of life boats to accommodate all on board.

One sometimes marvels at the great improvements in the American navy, and the old Oregon that brought comfort to the American people in the Spanish-American war, is now a back number in comparison to the modern dreadnaughts that are entertaining the Mexicans. But the Vaterland marks an epoch in shipbuilding far more important than the growth shown in the navies of the world. Eight hundred passengers can be seated at one time in the dining room, and it is doubtful if there is a hotel room in the United States more sumptuous in its parlors than the great public cabin, which is roofed with glass, uninterrupted by pillars or supports of any kind, and illuminated by concealed lights. So complete is this room that it is equipped with a theatrical stage.

What would the captains of early days think of the modern ship, with its four captains and a commodore over all; equipped with swimming pools that put to shame some of those in the best gymnasiums; with smoking rooms as big as the porch of a summer hotel; and with barber shops big enough for a small city. And in the first cabin alone there are more than 250 baths.

The Vaterland is not only a ship rich in comfort for the passengers who can pay for the best, but its second class cabins out rival the first class of many modern Atlantic liners, while the first cabins of the steamers of a generation ago were inferior to the cabins provided for the immigrants who will arrive on the Vaterland the middle of next month.

Haden Brisbin made an auto record Sunday that was not at a bad for any car when he ran 111 miles on seven gallons of gasoline; in doing this he pulled the grade at Biggs twice and the Fulton grade from as far as the road makers camp. The party started with Todd McCoy in another car at nine o'clock Sunday evening, but Todd had a flat tire and lost a rim before he left Moro.

REPUBLICAN VOTERS SHOULD BEWARE

Party Should Be Represented on National Committee By a Republican

The Republicans of Oregon are entitled to have a Republican named as the National Republican Committeeman from this State. C. W. Ackerson, who claims to be a Republican, is a candidate. He registered as a Progressive January 5, 1914. Then signed petition of H. W. Coe to be Progressive National Committeeman. Then cancelled his registration as a Progressive and registered as a Republican and immediately filed his candidacy for membership on Republican National Committee. Has been an intimate and convenient understudy of the Progressive National Committeeman and seems now to be in combination with him in an attempt to shanghai the Republican organization. His candidacy is being actively backed by parties hostile to the Republican party and having personal interests and private personal grudges to serve. His erratic and excitable temperament has frequently led him to flood the columns of the press with violent attacks upon the Republican party and vicious personal abuse of prominent Republicans and life-long residents of the State.

It is a grave abuse for parties who are not Republican to register as such. It is a grave abuse for outsiders to attempt the capture of a political party to gratify a personal grudge and to promote party discord. It is an abuse against which fair-minded men of all parties will rise in protest. We can never have a reunited party by pushing to the front political hotbeds and men who are political reformers simply for the sake of office. Having been a Republican only twenty-four hours when he announced his candidacy for the highest honorary position in the gift of the party, is some indication of what Mr. Ackerson's motive was in registering as a Republican. As Hon. Ralph E. Williams is the only Republican who is a candidate for Republican National Committeeman, we feel warranted in urging all loyal Republicans in the state to give him their earnest and enthusiastic support.
