### Memorial Day Observance at Moro.

The M. E. church at Moro was crowded to capacity last Sunday by an audience gathered to do honor to the heroes of our country. The church was appropriately decorated with bunting; the portrait of Washington was hung in the center of the pulpit with the portrait of Lincoln on the right hand of the speaker and the portrait of Grant to the left.

Postmaster John M. Parry, the only veteran resident in the county who fought at Gettysburg and who last year attended the semi-centennial observance of that fight at the reunion of the two armies on that battlefield, was the principle speaker.

Mr. Parry said, in part, that the observance of Memorial Day was more of an honor to the living than to the dead as the dead now do not care and the lessons to be learned are all for those living and the love of country and its future results must be left with and for the generations that will control the future destinies of this country. The speaker further said that in the history of every nation there comes an hour, a minute, when its fate hangs suspended by a hair and that the battle of Gettysburg was such an event in the history of the United States for the reason that if the confederacy had there triumphed a division into two nations and possibly three would have been the ultimate fate of the United States.

Memorial Day is not merely a holiday, a day for sports and of cessation from labor; it is a holy day; the commemoration of popular self government and of the republic that, despite whatever weaknesses and imperfections, on the whole approximates to that city of God on earth of which poets have dreamed and for which freedom loving men have poured out their blood like water. It should be a day of consecration and dedication; a day on which we dedicate our selves anew to the service of our country and consecrate our service with the hallowed memories of noble men and their ennobling deeds.

### Wasco Home Talent in Drama.

War in Dixie at the Moro opera house last Saturday evening as staged by the young people of our neighbor city for the benefit of the Wasco M. E. church was an exceptionally entertaining drama. The young actors knew their lines and moved promptly when their cue appeared.

### Weather for the Month of May.

The total rainfall for the month of May was only 76 hundredths of an inch; nearly half an inch below the normal for that month for the past nine years. This ordinarily would seriously affect the growing crops were it not that in the month of April we had a total of 2.06 inches of rain, the largest amount of rain for April during the last eleven years.

The temperatures for May have been the highest since the establishment of Experiment Station at Moro. The average maximum temperature for the month was 70 degrees, 4 1/2 degrees higher than the average maximum temperature for May of last year. There were six days of the month with maximum temperatures of 80 degrees or higher. The highest temperature during the month was 88 degrees on the 31st and the lowest temperature recorded during the month was 32 degrees on the 27th. In the vicinity of Moro this fall in temperature did no material damage, but in the southern part of the county the potato crop and gardens were nipped severely.

The total evaporation for the month was 7.39 inches, exceeding by more than an inch the evaporation for May last year and being the highest May evaporation recorded at the Experiment Station.

For the above data this office is indebted to Supt. Stephens of the Experiment Station.
