### Sherman County Exhibit at State Fair.

It is especially desired that Sherman county make an exhibit at the Oregon State Fair which will open at Salem Sept. 28th and closes October 3d. To that end the State Fair Board sent its field representative Albert Tozier, to this county to talk the matter over with Secretary F. E. Fortner, of the Sherman County Fair, and others.

The state is divided this year into three districts, thus placing this county in competition with those of the same climatic conditions. Each county exhibiting will be allowed \$100 by the State Fair Board, and in addition to this money it is possible for the county to capture \$200 in cash prizes.

Mr. Tozier states that as a good exhibit will be prepared for the home fair the same display can be sent to Salem and returned in time for showing here. As an inducement to the children to take an interest in their home fairs the State Fair Board will entertain the two from each county who score the highest in their industrial exhibits. The children will be admitted to the shows, grand stand, etc., and will be well cared for while away from home.

It is the belief of the Fair Board that 60,000 people will visit the State Fair this fall, and an exhibit made by this county will prove an excellent advertisement for a county that is destined to become rich in diversified farming.

Since the last State Fair four miles of tiling have been placed in the center field of the race track making it possible to train on that track the entire year. At this time there are sixty horses in training. A new pavilion is under way which when completed will be 243x120 feet. In this building will be housed the exhibits from the several counties, the entire lower portion to be given to them. Sherman county will have the same amount of space as the others. The fourteen big stock barns will be filled. Free attractions will be more than ever before. In the old pavilion will be shown the exhibits from the children's industrial fairs.

Here is an opportunity for this county to make an excellent display at the State Fair and receive in return money enough to more than pay expenses.
