Edw Tomlin played with the Grass Valley nine during the baseball series of last week with the Portland aggregation; he held 2d in one game and 3d in another.

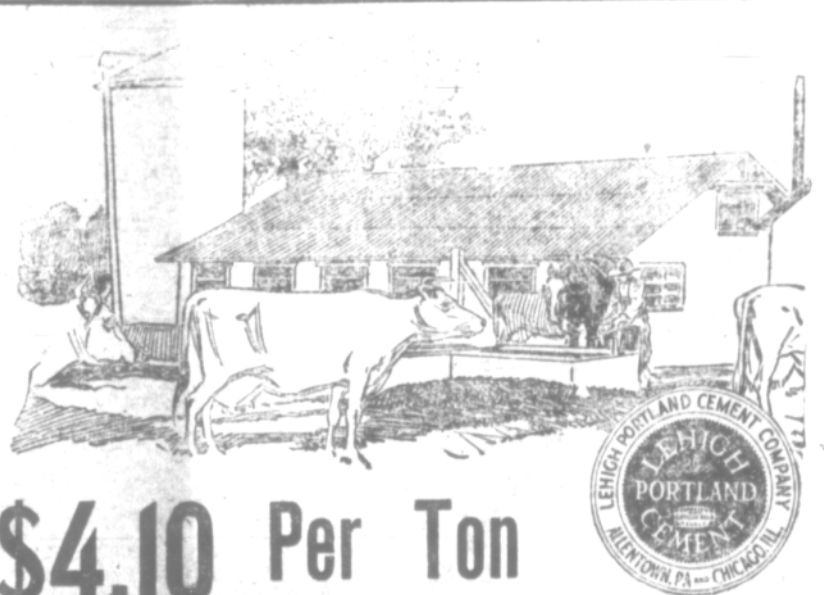
