The Election in Sherman County.

Sherman has again proven the oft repeated assertion that in state and national politics the county is republican, altho in our own local affairs but once in the history of the county has the entire ticket received united republican support. This year there was no opposition between the parties at the county primaries and still less at the election for local office.

All republican candidates on state and national tickets carried this county. Only two of the 29 measures on the ballot carried in Sherman county, restricting the right to vote to American citizens and the prohibition amendment, the last by a vote of 807 to 450.

The eight hour law was defeated in the county by a vote of 107 to 1087; the \$1500 tax exemption by 179 to 919; the death penalty by 398 to 651; increasing the term of county officers 493 to 521.

In the state returns indicate that Withycombe has beaten Smith for governor by the largest margin of votes ever received for that office; that Chamberlain has been elected over Booth for United States senator, altho not by as large a vote in Multnomah county as was expected; the state voted dry by more than 20,000 and latest reports also place Washington and Colorado in the dry ranks, California remaining wet.

Jacob Hinkle, an Oregon pioneer of 1853, died at his Philomath home October 26th. He was one of the founders of the present Oregon Agricultural College at Corvallis. Mr. Hinkle was an uncle to Mrs. A. C. Thompson of Monkland, the family is one of the few in America that has proof of their identification with colonial affairs in a period of American history dating prior to the revolutionary war.
