Superintendent D. E. Stephens of the Experiment Farm, was a guest last week of Hon. Sam Hill at his Maryhill home. Mr. S. said that a new ferry, capable of accommodating four autos each trip would soon be in commission between the Oregon end of the state built highway at Biggs and the opposite side of the Columbia river at Maryhill. Mr. Stephens quotes Mr. Hill as saying that the road from Maryhill to Goldendale is being thoroughly rebuilt and that a first class road is in use now from Goldendale to White Salmon where a ferry to Hood River allows access to the Columbia river highway without traveling the hard mountain grades of Wasco county.
