Report of the Circuit Court.

The regular November term of
the circuit court was convened by
Judge Parker Monday morning
with Attorneys W.H. Wilson, C.J.
Bright, R.R. Butler, and M. G.
Ellis, of The Dalles; B.S. Hunting-
ton and L. E. Crouch of Port-
land; C. M. Huddleston of Wasco
and W. C. Bryant and Grover J.
Duffey of Moro, attending.

Indictment, state vs Bert Comb.
Two indictments returned by the
grand jury. Assault with a dan-
gerous weapon, plea of guilty.

Indictment, state vs H. Keefer
and Jack Michael. Burglarizing
the A.S. Porter residence, plea of
guilty.

The members of the grand jury
chosen for the term are Frank
Olds, E.R. McMillin, L.V. Moore,
J. F. Royse, Wm. Taylor, W. S.
Powell, Geo. Witter.

The case of Shumaker vs Moffit
had been at issue once before in
this court; a jury had decided in
favor of Shumaker; on appeal to
the state supreme court had been
sent back for a retrial. The fol-
lowing jury again decided in favor
of Shumaker: W. B. Johnston, Vic
Andersen, John Dougherty, L. N.
Lemmon, A. D. Richeldorfer, E.
Amidon, Robt. Urquhart, A. L.
Russell, Roy Rich, G. E. Wilk-
erson, L. E. Langford, E. M. Alley.
The point in litigation is Moffit
claims that a certain check, given
by him and cashed by Shumaker,
marked payment in full, closed
the account.

The case of Dick Ogle vs Hap-
pold was a question of damaged
grain. Tried before the following
jury: G. C. Vinton, Roy Rich, Ray
Ragsdale, John Dougherty, L. J.
Pape, W. H. Burres, Robt. Urqu-
hart, L. N. Lemmon, Jas. Stewart,
W. F. Jackson, A. Hunter, S. J.
Ritchey. Suit was for \$400 dam-
age, jury awarded \$60.

Case of Ev. Sink vs J. M. Allen
is a collection of a note given by
Allen as part of the commission
earned in a real estate deal. Sink
is the third or fourth owner of the
note, which Allen claims does not
represent value received. Tried
before the following jury: L. E.
Langford, W. B. Johnston, G. E.
Wilkerson, Ray Ragsdale, E. M.
Alley, H.T. Peugh, A. L. Russell,
W. H. Burres, John Dougherty,
H.B. Belshie, O.N. Ruggles, L.N.
Lemmon. Given to the jury at
7 p.m., after being out all night
verdict returned favor Allen.

The litigation at this court term
of interest to a large number who
had no direct concern in the cause
was known as the "road case" and
is a proposed new road beginning
at the east and west road between
the Martin Hansen and O. L.
Belshie farms, in the Rutledge
district, following Grass Valley
canyon in a northerly direction
to a juncture with Hay canyon at
the warehouses. As originally laid
out the road was to continue on
the west side of the canyon, but
A.K. Fuller, A. Nish, Fred Mahrt,
Mrs. M. J. Willerton, Herman
Pape, united to contest the route
and the awards of the viewers.
A jury was called to decide the
controversy and the trial was ad-
journd to allow the jury to view
the ground. Then the attorneys
and parties in interest agreed to a
compromise; the road now is to
cross to the east side near the
north line of the P.C. Axtell farm
and cross back again to the west
side near mouth of Bull canyon.
The county also agreed to build a
26-inch woven wire hog fence two
barb wires on top on both sides
of the 40-foot right of way on the
Nish, Fuller, Willerton, Pape, and
Mahrt farms and also pay the first
four \$50 each and the last named
\$100, as complete settlement.

Court was still in session when
the Observer was being printed.

C. F. Savage of Pendleton, the
Underwood typewriter salesman,
was in our city Tuesday. He was

In the one hour professional class
Emil A. Trefzger won by 129 per

last year, was next with 8243 words
119 errors. 595 penalty, 7648 net,
127 per minute. In the 30 minute
amateur class Bessie Friedman
won; 4019 words, 31 errors, 155
penalty, 3864 net, tying the pro-
fessional score of 129.
