Sherman County Settlers' Land Claims

Congressman N. J. Sinnott was in Moro last Thursday evening, meeting with the citizens of this county who have claims pending against the government by reason of being dispossessed of their land in favor of the E.O.L.Co.

Mr. Sinnott told the meeting very frankly that he could secure a favorable committee report in the house last March, when the relief bill came to the house for the senate. In all honesty he started to do so; and found that the bill provided relief for settlers who had stated to the land department in writing that they were not entitled to relief and of others who had admitted never making improvements or living on the homestead.

Regardless of favorable reports by committees, such bills could never become laws and Mr. Sinnott knew it, and let the bill remain in committee. He did, however, send for Attorney Herrick who admitted to the Congressman that he had never read the papers in this matter, altho taking the settlers' money for years, and had never given it the attention it deserved.

Mr. Sinnott then stated that after the discovery of the defects in the bill presented by this attorney he has used nearly all his spare moments during all of last summer in determining the legitimate claims and will embody them in a bill which no one need hesitate to back.

That the central figures of those who, were at one time active in the making of American history are passing from life's stage is again attested by the death, at the family home in Portland, of J.D. Jackson, father of R. D. Jackson of this city, last Sunday the 19th. Mr. Jackson participated in three distinctively historical American events: the battle of Gettysburg at Round Top, the capture of the Confederate president Jefferson Davis, and the celebration of the 50th anniversary commemorative of the Battle of Gettysburg.

Some of the Gilliam county farmers who sold their wheat under contract and then refused to deliver, selling to other parties, have been sued on their contract. As a defense it is claimed no money was paid down.

Help the Belgian Sufferers.

The flour millers of the United States are making up a donation shipment of flour for the relief of the suffering women and children of Belgium. The relief work is known as the Flour Millers' Belgian Relief Movement and is under the direct sanction of the United States government and the British, Dutch, and German governments have all agreed to give quick and free passage to the shipment.

The flour will be shipped from Philadelphia about the middle of December; going by way of London where it will be taken in charge by the American ambassador commission who will put it on smaller vessels and take it to Rotterdam and from there to Brussels by rail, where it will be distributed where most needed by Brand Whitlock, American minister to Belgium.

The main office of the W.W. M. Co. at The Dalles and the company representatives in this county are taking an active part in the movement. The company has made a special rate, for this purpose, of \$4.50 a barrel and for each such sum subscribed will add a sack of flour to their contribution already made.

E. O. McCoy writing to L. Barnum said "I think the farmers of Sherman county are fully as liberal and as anxious to help suffering people as anyone on the globe, hence I thought they ought to be given this chance. Practically this is the only donation that is being given that you can have any assurance will reach the parties for whom intended and who are actually suffering and starving for it."

Twenty barrels were subscribed in Moro before this letter got to the Observer office. Remember that your \$4.50 puts five sacks of flour into Brussels; every railroad in the United States is doing their part free; so is the steamship companies and all who have anything to do with it.

The names of all contributing will be published next week.
