Sheldon, dean of the school of education at the University of Oregon, who said that the state superintendent is considering the raising of high school standards.

For the best results with potted plants the O.A.C. horticultural department recommends a mixture of one-half measure of sand and one measure each of well rotted manure and leaf mold. The large amount of loam is required to prevent acidity, which is very likely to develop when the plant is kept too wet. This danger of acidity can be eliminated by adding about one per cent of air slacked lime to the mixture.

Garland was only 22 years of age, born in the Willamette valley, and was a cheerful, likeable and industrious young man, and at the time of his death was engaged in farming part of the E. O. L.
