Seven tons of acclimated seed corn will be distributed among farmers in O-W.R. & N. territory by that company during March. It is the intention to see that each interested farmer receives enough seed to plant at least two acres which will enable any one to prove to his own satisfaction that corn can be made a success.

Plowing is general on the farms north of Wasco and vicinity.

Rain, snow, and more rain with nice sunny days in between is the weather report for the past week.

Saturday evening at Kent, three hours of hard rain followed by seven inches of wet snow and then nice weather.

Among the visitors in the city during the last week was our old friend, Mr. Ol' Sol. The old gentleman fairly beamed his pleasure at being back.

It is reported that many farmers in the Willamette valley are plowing up clover fields and clearing brush lands for the purpose of increasing their wheat acreage.

The horses recently sold in this county for use in the French army left Caldwell, Idaho, on the 22d for Jersey City. The shipment totaled 2000 head and made a train of 30 cars, five cars being heavy draft horses.

The Washington state legislature has voted an additional \$60,000 for the state road on the north bank of the Columbia opposite Cascade Locks. A similar amount had previously been spent on the highway by the state.

Samuel Hill has resigned as a member of the Belgian relief commission and Governor Withycombe has appointed T.B. Wilcox of the Portland Flouring Mill Co to the vacancy. The present membership of the relief committee is T.B. Wilcox, Miss Henrietta Failing, Joseph Van Hooissen, C. Henri Labbe, the Belgian consul at Portland, and Dr. O. J. Goffin, a former resident of Moro now at Portland.

The coming season will see a larger crop of wheat grown in the world than ever before in its history. Every section that can grow wheat is increasing their acreage to the utmost limit. To the additional acreage crop prospect must be added the chance of a two years' crop that Russia may be able to put on the market when ever the allied fleets may be able to break the Turkish control of the trade route from Russia into the Mediterranean sea.

The masque ball Monday even was the premier social success of the season. The opera house ball room floor was in perfect condition and the music was the best ever, while the large attendance made dancing difficult at times. Prizes were awarded to Miss Gist, as a countrified old maid, and L. W. Ross, as a chinaman, for the most unique lady and gentleman character; and to Mrs. Loring of Shaniko, as a Turkish girl, and R. D. Jackson, as a high school boy, for the best sustained lady and gentleman character; to the ladies a piece of cut glass and to the gentlemen a set of cuff buttons.

A very successful meeting of the Demoss school literary society was held last Saturday evening at the school house. A report of the evening received at this office says that "in spite of the dark and stormy night D.E. Stephens made the drive from the Experiment Station to our school house and gave a very interesting and helpful talk on Diversified Farming in Sherman County, telling what other crops than wheat can be grown to advantage in eastern Oregon.
