

TO BUILD MORE DURING THIS YEAY.

Many New Buildings on Farms and in Cities Expected in This Vicinity During the Present Year.

Many more new buildings for Moro and vicinity are predicted both in town and in the country. The general feeling of better times is rapidly spreading and with the advent of spring, new jobs are opening up.

Many modern step-saving homes are being contemplated. A general improvement in the architecture of the homes of this vicinity is being noticed. The plan book which the Tum-A-Lum Lumber Co. loan to prospective home builders contains over one hundred designs of homes, all of which have been built in the Northwest before, and have been designed by Northwest architects, so they are appropriate for this part of the country.

Barns, General Purpose Barns, Horse Barns, and Dairy Barns, are being contemplated. In two-story barns, the special Tum-A-Lum Circle roof or Gambrel roof seem to be the two styles most favored. Both of these are self supporting and will be found in the special Tum-A-Lum Plan Book.

The Tum-A-Lum Silo has been designed by their engineers, to be built of stock lumber from their free plans. They have proven very satisfactory and are recommended over stave silos for hot dry climates. By reason of absence of patents, their cost is about one half the cost of patented stave silos.

Hogsheds, Chicken Houses, Milk Houses, etc., will make up a large part of the smaller types of buildings. Many of the designs of these buildings, which have proven most satisfactory elsewhere, are to be found in the Free Plan Books of the Tum-A-Lum Lumber Co., as well as a number of model school houses of one room up.

1915 Rose Festival Receives Work of
Art from Famous Oregon Boy.



Portland's 1915 Rose Festival has a
unique poster—the most artistic ever
used and it is the work of an Oregon
boy, Fred G. Cooper, now one of the
world's foremost artists. His father,
J. C. Cooper, of McMinnville, Oregon,
wrote the winning slogan, "The Whole
World Knows the Portland Rose." At
his father's personal request young
Cooper donated the poster to incorpo-
rate the slogan. Portland has co-
operated with Seattle, Tacoma, Walla
Walla and Spokane in securing con-
tentions that will bring more than
21,000 visitors to Washington and
Oregon.
