Burnetts Moving Picture Theatre.

Saturday evening of this week at Burnetts Moro Theatre will be shown some extra good moving pictures. A special Sunday matinee will be put on at five o'clock and at the Sunday afternoon show will also be shown twenty five colored lantern slides showing a large variety of views of the Panama Pacific International Exposition at San Francisco.
