Weather Report for March.

The highest temperature for
March was recorded on the 19th,
65 degrees; the lowest on the 24th
and 25th, 30 degrees. As a whole
the month has been much warmer
than normal. In addition to giv-
ing winter grains a good start, the
warm weather has started weeds
growing so that there will be little
excuse this year for any Sherman
county farmer to grow a crop of
russian thistles on his summer fal-
low or in his spring grain.

The total rainfall for the month
of March was 1.25 inches. This
exceeds the 10-year normal by a
little more than half an inch. The
total rainfall for March, 1914, was
only .11 of an inch. The highest
rainfall recorded during March
for the past ten years was 1.65
inches in the year 1906.
