An Attempted Jail Break.

deep by rule measurement. Mr.
Medler is averaging 25 acres a day
of ten hours and is doing some of
the best plowing ever done in the
county; every furrow is the same
exact depth and each is a perfect
uniform turn-over counterpart of
the preceding furrow; with the
Holt caterpillar plowing there is
no tramped down corners caused
by the turning of the plow teams
which leaves every bit of the land
mellow. Where the plows now
go through the old team tramped
corners the ground is as hard as
an old road.
