ing of the Celilo canal at The
Dalles and Big Eddy a special
train will leave Kent Wednesday,
May 5th, at about 7 a.m., Grass
Valley about 7:45, Moro 8:20,
Wasco 9:20 and arrive at The
Dalles in time for the morning
program. The program at Big
Eddy is in the afternoon.

On the return the train leaves
The Dalles at 9:15 p.m. Tickets
will be one and a third regular
fare; an agent will sell tickets on
the train, so that all stations can
receive the reduced rates. Tickets
