Wasco County Permanent Roads

The state engineer in charge of the survey and location of the Columbia Highway between Mosier and The Dalles, has been instructed by the Wasco county court to continue the survey east of The Dalles to the Deschutes river, with an estimate of the probable cost of a bridge across that stream; also to survey a trunk line road from The Dalles to Dufur and thence to the top of Tygh Ridge to connect with the new grade into Tygh valley; also another trunk line to penetrate the Wrentham district.

This means that Wasco county roads connecting with the Columbia highway will be put into splendid shape, and that a movement is started to spend thousands of dollars in putting a network of trunk line roads over Wasco county.

Dr. Theo. Beletski, veterinarian, of Wasco, showed his enterprising spirit by securing a new auto with which to answer calls for his professional services. Before the iron of his former auto had cooled after going through the fire at the Atwood & Lee garage, he had completed arrangements by which he is now owner of an entirely new machine. Nearly all his surgical instruments were also lost in the same fire, but he now has a more up-to-date equipment than before.

The county court for Hood River has rejected all bids for road improvement on all roads leading east from Hood River town. They announce their intention to spend all the surplus funds on roads to the west of that city and leading to the upper valley. Possibly Hood River wants to shut The Dalles out of a "loop route" around Mt. Hood, by way of Barlow road and the Columbia Highway.

A meeting of the school principals of the county was held at Moro Saturday to arrange for the coming school children's fair and the school meet next spring. Those attending were E. R. Curfman from Kent, S. W. Babcock from Grass Valley, F. E. Dunton from Moro, J. O. Russell from Wasco, C. L. McCurny from Rufus, and F. E. Fagan, county superintendent.

P. Waldo Davis is entertaining the crowds at special functions at the Panama Pacific Exposition at San Francisco. A program shown us this week of a special series of entertainments in the Palace of Mines and Metallurgy gave Mr. Davis and his Golden Chimes a prominent place. That week he had eight engagements; one for Sunday at a popular church.

The management of the Weinhard brewery of Portland, announce the conclusion of successful experiments by which a legal near beer can be manufactured by them after January 1st, next.

Opportunity is now offered all farmers and other producers to engage in the mail order business by disposing of their products through the medium of the parcel post. Never before has a greater opportunity been offered to producers to build up a profitable business. The post office department agrees to advertise your name and the products you have for sale without cost to you. Experiments conducted so far indicate that the "Farm to Table" plan is a comparative success and is capable of being developed to much larger proportions. If you have farm products to ship by parcel post write the Postmaster, Portland, Oregon, what you have and the prices you want. Your name will then be published in the list now being compiled. There is a big demand for home-cured hams and bacon, smoked and fresh meats, poultry, eggs, butter, vegetables and other farm products at reasonable prices.

Information regarding containers, rates, and other matter concerning the "Farm to Table" plan may be had by writing to the postmaster at Portland.

Room for Optimism.

The attendance at the Presbyterian Sabbath school September 28th, 1902, was 48, the collection \$7 cents. On the corresponding Sabbath, 1915, the attendance was 96 and the contribution \$2.95. The attendance was doubly increased while the contribution on last Sabbath was more than five times that of 1902. These figures and dates were taken at random by our informant and, since Moro's increase in population in the meantime has been but slight, we may very pertinently put the question: Is the Sabbath school a decadent institution?

Moro Business Firm Makes Change.

J. C. Freeman has sold a half interest in his dry goods store to O. L. Belshee and from this date the business will be conducted at the same place of business as formerly under the firm name of J. C. Freeman & Co.

Mr. Freeman says that the stock will be increased to equal the demands of the trade and that this store is the only exclusive dry goods store in the county. A large stock of new and seasonable merchandise is due to arrive next week for the new firm.

F. E. Fagan, county school superintendent, states that the local teachers institute will be held at Moro this year during Thanksgiving week. An efficient corps of instructors has been secured, including the state superintendent, J. A. Churchill, and Mrs. M. L. Fulkerson, a well known rural school and primary instructor of Salem.

Other towns may boast of "no houses to rent" in their midst. Moro goes them one better, here the house has to be bought if you wish its use undisturbed. Three new residences will be built in Moro this year to supply the demand and more in prospect. Just a conservative growth of a good city, no boom being staged in any particular.

G. W. Hansell arrived home Sunday from Idaho where he has farming interests. He said the farmers of that section had used all their available storage facilities and were not shipping wheat, preferring to wait for a change in price.
