Moro School Joins Debating League.

F. E. Dunton, principal of the Moro public schools, was in The Dalles Saturday last, arranging for the participation of the schools of this city in the state wide school debating league of Oregon.

It has been arranged that the central northern counties of Oregon shall constitute one sector in the state debating league, this being formed by the counties of Jefferson, Crook, Wasco, Sherman and Hood River and the high schools from Prineville, Redmond, Bend, Madras, The Dalles, Wasco and Moro. Of these seven schools, four, the first named, shall have try-outs among each other; the last three will have try-outs separately from the first four. The winning teams from each division to debate each other and the winning team then to meet other winning teams from other eastern Oregon divisions until one team from eastern Oregon shall be eligible to meet a team from western Oregon to be chosen in the same manner.

The first debates under the schedule, as arranged by the state officers, will be the third Friday in February when the Moro affirmative team will meet the Wasco negative team at Moro. Also the same night the Moro negative team will debate The Dalles affirmative team at The Dalles.

Kent Social Happenings.

Residents of Kent are well pleased with the way the pupils of this district had exhibits at the school children's fair. Twenty-four sent in ninety-three exhibits and some of the pupils are now at work on exhibits for the fair to be held next year.

Last Saturday basket ball back stops were erected on the school playground. Traveling rings, swings and two giant strides, we hear, are to be added to our school ground apparatus in the near future.

Friday afternoon the school had a Christopher Columbus and Whitcomb Riley day. A fine program was a feature presented by the school, several parents and teachers being present. The program began with the song "America," by all the school; followed by reading a letter written by Whitcomb Riley, presented by Glenna Dellinger; then followed recitations by a number of the pupils and this was followed by the song, "Columbia the Gem of the Ocean." Part of the program was an address and original poem by Granville Phillips. The afternoon closed with a short talk by E. R. Curfman, principal of the Kent schools.

In Memorium

On the 20th day of May, A.D. 1901, Eureka Lodge A.F. & A.M. in accordance with custom of the fraternity from time immemorial consigned to Mother Earth the mortal remains of Obed Cushman, a charter member of the Lodge. This was the first Masonic funeral ever held in Moro.

From resolutions adopted by the lodge at a stated communication held June 3rd, 1901 we quote: "The Supreme Architect of the universe, who doeth all things well, has in His divine wisdom taken from our midst our beloved brother Obed Cushman who died on the 18th day of May, 1901, aged 78 years, and

"Whereas our departed brother was a true and good man, one of nature's noblemen, highly esteemed as a Citizen, Neighbor and Mason, and whereas it is right and proper that resolutions of respect be adopted by this lodge as a tribute of respect to his memory."

"Now after the passing of more than fifteen years Bethlehem Chapter has been called to perform the last sad rite over the remains of one of her charter members, our dear sister Elizabeth Ellen Hufford Cushman, who died September 17th and was consigned to the grave Sunday, September 19, 1915, by Bethlehem Chapter. This being the first funeral ever held by the order in Moro, thus linking husband and wife by a double tie to the fraternity.

Therefore, it is right and proper that as a Chapter we should give expression to our sorrow and sympathy, for the place once so worthily filled by our sister is now vacant. One link in the golden chain is broken, broken never to be again welded in this world, but the parting is but temporary if we who remain to mourn her loss are but true to the teachings of our beloved order. Therefore be it,

Resolved, by Bethlehem Chapter No. 78 O. E. S. in regular session assembled that we deplore her death and extend to the dear ones she has left behind our heartfelt sympathy, but would urge them in this hour of loneliness and sorrow to remember that their loss is mother's gain for we are assured that her last days were bright with hope of a glorious immortality.

From the teachings of our order we learn, "There beyond the grave the loved ones gone before are waiting to welcome us to our eternal home." She died believing this; then to you son, daughters, we would say, turn from the grave, look beyond to that "Temple not made with hands eternal in the heavens," where all the soul shall enjoy will be perfect bliss and all it shall express shall be perfect praise, where love divine shall ennoble every heart and hallelujahs exalted employ every tongue.

Remember, that when the Son of Righteousness shall descend and send forth his angels to collect the ransomed dead then father and mother shall come forth to eternal day. Therefore be it

Resolved, by Bethlehem Chapter that the above preamble and resolution be adopted by this Chapter, that they be spread upon

the records of the Chapter, that a certified copy under seal of the Chapter be given to each son and daughter and one copy furnished to the Sherman County Observer for publication. And be it farther,

Resolved, that in loving memory of our departed sister the charter of the Chapter shall be draped in mourning, and mourning placed on the altar and thus remain for 30 days.
