War Declared.

Grerzhoffen, Thursday, Oct. 21.—(Special cable via Constantinople, Singapore and Sydney from our own correspondent.)—The heavy fighting that followed the declaration of war between the kingdoms of Gretzhoffen and Grahoffen in "The Broken Coin" continues unabated. Marines were landed from the battleships Wisconsin, Missouri and Ohio this past week and the 650 Americans will try to establish order in the disturbed country, which is now in the throes of what amounts to civil war.
