At the Hay Canyon meeting, Friday, of those interested in securing a rural route mail delivery out of Moro to the farms north and east of this place a committee was appointed consisting of W. H. Burres from the Fairview district, P. C. Axtell from the Hay Canyon district, and W. H. Ragsdale from the Boardman district, to ascertain the wish of the residents along the proposed route and report as soon as possible.

Circuit Court Notes.

The regular November term of the circuit court for Sherman county convened in this city Monday, Judge D.R. Parker presiding.

John Hardin, O. C. Hogue, E. C. McMillin, G. C. Friedly, P. F. Peddicord, J. L. Matthes, and C. D. O'Leary were drawn as a grand jury for the term.

In the case of the State vs. Norville Mills, charged with larceny of a horse, plea of guilty; crime carries a sentence of from one to ten years.

The first jury trial before the court was that of the State vs. W. A. Kentner and H. A. Wattles, charged with the larceny of wheat. The case went to trial Monday before the following jury: John Mathieson, M. L. Evans, L. J. Lucas, F. W. Lindsay, J. N. Landry, D. A. Maxwell, S. B. Holmes, W. S. Fields, John Hasting, D. L. Hull, O. L. Belhice, A. S. Porter. After the state had its case presented the defense moved a nonsuit, charging defective indictment. After considerable argument a compromise was effected and the defendants pled guilty to petty larceny instead of grand larceny as charged and the jury was discharged.

Ray Bell, witness in the circuit court this week in the wheat larceny case, left Wednesday for his new home at Malone, Utah. Ray secured in the neighborhood of \$300 from the county in mileage and time, his subpoena not being served until after he left the county.

The Oregon society of the Sons of the American Revolution presented to Judge Parker, in open court Monday, a silk American flag for use in naturalization proceedings. On behalf of the society the presentation was made by Attorney W. C. Bryant of this city, who told of the inception of the plan of the society to present each circuit court in the state with a flag for use on such occasions and who spoke of the great obligations and benefits of American citizenship. The flag was accepted by Judge Parker in a short speech expressing his appreciation of the honor conferred.

Chris Schultz was the first to be accepted as an American citizen under the folds of the presented flag. He renounced his allegiance to the Danish government to become an American citizen, shortly after the flag was presented.

The case of George Kaseberg, vs. Wm. Barnett went to trial Wednesday before the following jury: L. J. Lucas, Asa Eslinger, F. W. Lindsay, Hal Morrow, A. T. Holt, W. C. Harper, Dell Olds, D. A. Maxwell, John Hasting, A. S. Porter, T. J. Henkle. This was a termination of a farm lease and dispute as to the valuation of summer fallow and the payment of a sack bill for rental wheat. Jury awarded Kaseberg \$700.

A jury for the personal damage case of Hobart Bowman vs. Wm. Oehman was being secured as we print the Observer late Thursday. The regular jury list was exhausted and a special list of eight was given the sheriff to be summoned. By special agreement these eight were to reside within a ten mile radius of Moro.

A. M. Wright left Thursday for Albany to attend the funeral of his nephew, Paul Leach, who died at the family home near that place Wednesday from the results of a fall from a 12-foot tank October 29th. He and a companion were soldering leaks inside the tank when the charcoal fumes began to be noticed and they started to leave the tank, upon getting outside and starting to go down the ladder the young lost his hold and fell. Paul Leach was 23 years old, the son of D. H. Leach who formerly lived in the Monkland section.
